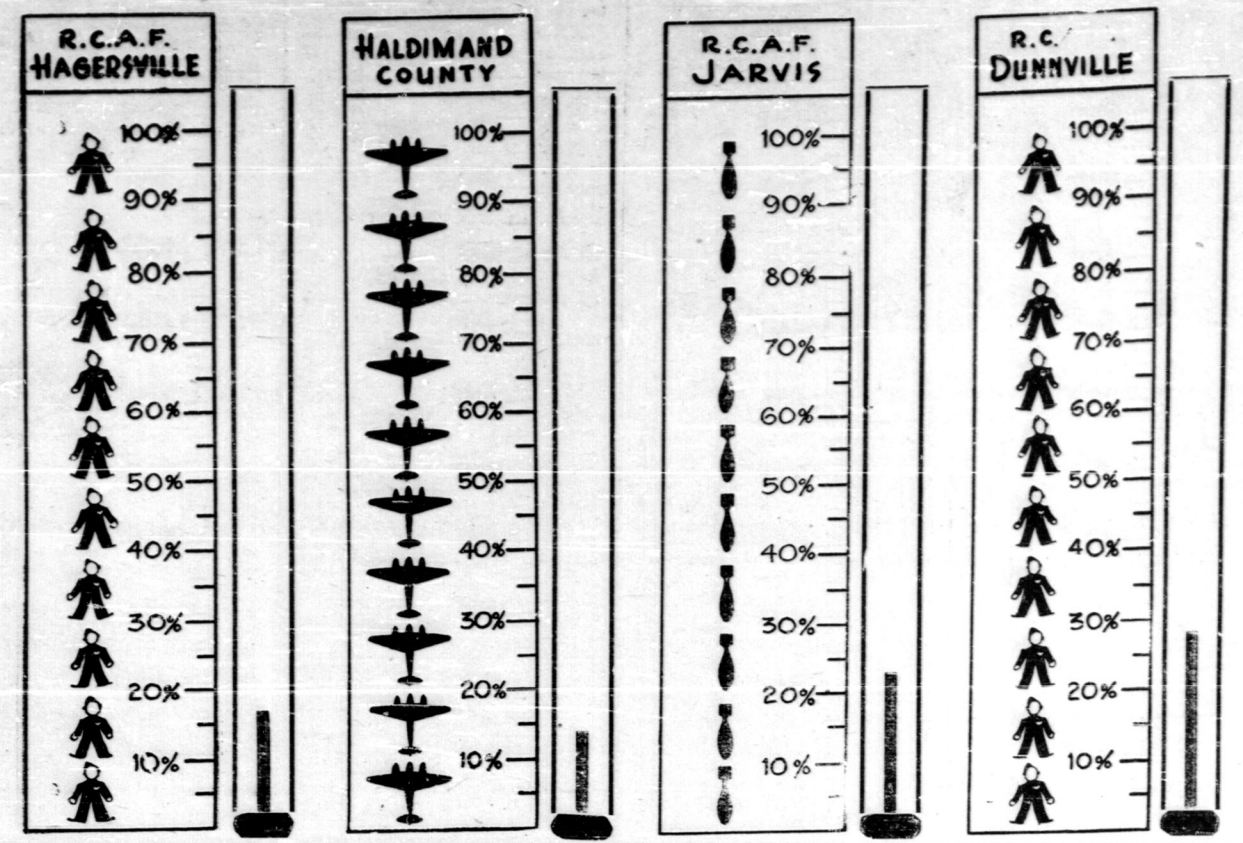


## Speed The Victory Contest

## FARMERS AND FARM WORKERS

If Your Farm Work has Slackened for the Winter, You Are Needed Elsewhere in Essential Employment

Highly essential work—very important in Canada's war effort and for the welfare of the Nation—is threatened with shortages of workers. One of the few sources of men available for other high priority jobs is those men on the farm who will not be needed at home during the Fall and Winter. Heavy needs must be met in many lines—producing fuel wood and other necessary forest products; in base metal mines, in food processing, in railway track maintenance. If you live on a farm and are not needed at home during the Fall and Winter, you are urged to answer this national appeal.

Farmers engaged in essential work during the off season will be allowed to return home when needed. Also, those on postponement under Mobilization Regulations will continue on postponement while in approved essential work during the slack on the farm.

## Success Depends on Rural Districts

## Poor Grain Crops Make Victory Bond Purchases More Difficult

But following is the opinion of one of the good farmers of Haldimand:

We are not going to profit to the same extent this year as we did in 1942, but we are going to live through the winter, and enjoy the highest standard of living of any group of people in any country in the world. We are going to be able to sleep peacefully too. But there is just one reason for that. Your son and my son, are over there preserving this haven of security for us. They are not grunting about it or asking for sympathy. But they do want to get back home. Back to Mum's apple pie, and the smell of real home cooking. They want to get off the sea lanes — to get away from the guns, the tanks, the bombs. They want to play ball again with the home town teams — to enjoy a "coke" at their favorite meeting place downtown — to sit down at night after a hard day's work in the hayfield, or behind the plow, and listen to their favorite radio program. These are the things they want to come home to. But they will not be home until the job they are doing is completed. Yes and they are not asking for sympathy when they suffer a set-back — even though with that set-back a pal is lost or blood is spilled.

Let's be done with this self sympathy business, because things haven't been just as we might have hoped for. Our duty is still clear. We must fight on — work — sacrifice — save and lend. Yes — most of us can still lend if we want to — if we just take ourselves out of that first line position and recognize it's the boys at the front who come first. Yes, we can buy bonds and we don't need anybody giving us a slap on the back for doing our duty.

In his Labor Day speech at Harvard University, Winston Churchill said "Whatever our station may be, whatever part we have to play, great or small, our conduct is liable to be scrutinized not only by history but by our own descendants. Let us rise to the full level of our duty and of our opportunity."

The farmers of Haldimand County can do just that — and will, by buying all the bonds they can in the 5th Victory Loan.

AIRPORTS STILL LEAD COUNTY IN PER CENTAGE OF MONEY RAISED

On Tuesday evening Haldimand County had raised only 41% of its quota in the Fifth Victory Loan, with only one more day to go to reach the half-way mark.

Officials are expressing concern with the returns coming in from the rural districts. The crop returns from the farms this year being down, it was naturally uncertain just what the results would be in the rural canvass. So far those results have proven to be worse than was at first anticipated and unless there is an upsurge in rural sales the balance of the loan, Haldimand County is going to have a tough time meeting its objective.
