## ON THE FARM FRONT

third of all farm homes, 37.3% to be exact enjoy the use of electricity; just over half (50.8%) have the telephone; 66.3% have a radio and 69.6% own a car. Alberta, Saskatchewan, British Columbia, and Manitoba in that order all have more farms with radios.

July was a good month for butter production in Halimand county. A total of 335,840 lbs. were made which is a 5.06% increase over the same month of last year. However, the county still lacks 71,243 lbs. to meet the seven months total of last year.

Some thought should be given to the fall management of pastures at this time of year. We all realize that pasture is the cheapest of all

feeds and sometimes we abuse our pasture fields on that account. Pastures should go into winter with a good strong top much the same as fall wheat; if they are to get a good start the next spring. Overgrazing reduces the yield and increases the injury from drought and frosts. This applies particularly in the case of some of the grasses. Harrowing to spread the droppings will promote uniform grazing.

The principal objection to the use of a disc or other wide implement in preference to a plow as advocated for Halimand county the week before last is that the land may be left too flat for good drainage. This may be so on some extremely level fields and particularly in seasons such as we have been experiencing. This does not necessarily alter the fact that this is a good practice to follow in these days of labour short

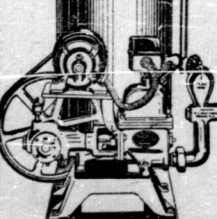

Dirty eggs are a nuisance and cause a loss of from 5 to 10 cents per dozen. It seems that some hens produce more dirty eggs than others in spite of anything that may be done. Dirty eggs as might be expected are a seasonal condition. It has been found that in certain flocks where as high as 24.6% of the eggs were dirty in March, this number dropped to 8.8% in July.

Sufficient nests should be provided to follow in one nest to six hens. The nests, obviously, should be kept clean by frequent removal of nesting material. Darkening of the nests and frequent gathering are known to reduce the number of dirty eggs by as much as 50%. The floor should be kept well covered and as dry as possible.

The cleaning of eggs is to be avoided as much as possible. Most certainly eggs should not be washed or even in cold water. Steel wool is one of the best things to use for this purpose.
