THE FIFTH wartime Easter bears the same hope that it has held and heralded through the ages. The religious festival of resurrection coincides with the season of renewal in the world of nature. Though we have watched the progress of as many springs as we have years, each recurrence brings its own wonder and newness. The dormancy of nature gives way to new life and the cycle of seedtime, growth and fulfillment begins again.

Victory will come — "that at least is sure." Prime Minister Churchill declared unequivocally in his recent address. The statement is the culmination of the sober confidence and progressive optimism he has successfully entertained since he became first minister, May 10, 1940, just before the collapse of France.

Implicit in such a declaration of surety is not only ultimate victory over forces of evil, but also the freeing of men's spirits from the darkness and hopelessness of dictator ideologies and their infamous deeds. There will be a new beginning, another spring as it were, in the history of civilization.

Self-delusion must not permit the thought that the brave new world of the post-war period will come as easily and unprompted as spring. The plans of far-seeing humanitarian statesmen and economists will remain plans unless we are prepared to expend ourselves for peace as we have had to do for mere survival.

The western hemisphere, mercifully spared the physical ravages of war and the degradation of occupied countries, is the hope of suffering peoples who are straining to hear the clarion call of emancipating invasion. When the tyranny that has sought to halt the progress of mankind has been battered out, the revivification of human decency in the exhausted lands will be the most welcome spring ever to come in the history of mankind.

A WISE DECISION

THOUSANDS of Canadian hearts were lightened last week by the announcement that time for payment of 1943 income tax balances has been extended to August 31st.

Many patriotic citizens, gloomy because of their conviction that they couldn't meet the income tax payments by April 30th and by Sixth Victory Loan bonds at the same time, now rejoice to find that they will not be barred from joining their fellow countrymen in the most important home war effort to date.

Most people have discovered that the purchase of Victory bonds gives them a tangible feeling that they are actually backing up Canadian men in uniform. To have taken away from a portion of these the opportunity of participating again would have been regrettable. There is ample proof that throughout the rank and file of Canadian citizens there is far more than enough ready cash to pass the minimum objective of \$1,200,000,000 for the Sixth Victory Loan campaign. With the income tax snag removed, sales to individuals should surpass all previous records.

Official Ottawa deserves added commendation in this regard because the income tax announcement was made a month before the Victory Loan opening instead of the eve of the campaign. Time has thus been allowed for a readjustment of personal budgets, and a spirit of buoyancy has been injected into the pre-loan period which should prove invaluable in the enthusiasm necessary to the success of any campaign.

OUR LAND A TRUST: We will treat our land as a heritage from the past which we will hold in trust for future generations. The soil has taken thousands of years to build and we will hand it on richer and more productive than we received it.

FEED THE NATION: We are called on to feed the nation now in time of war and a starving world when the war is won. In a spirit of unselfish patriotism we will play our fullest part in the nation's war effort and in her task of rearing the world.

DEFEND THE NATION FROM THE FOE WITHIN: We can defend Canada from the foe within, while the men at the front defend her from the foe without. Canada has no more deadly enemy than those forces which work to break down her moral character, to destroy her faith in God and divide her by setting class against class and race against race. When the farmer stands firm and fights for the moral rearmament of the nation, Canada will be proof against these evils.

SOUND HOMES FOR SOUND FARMS: We will make our home life a pattern for the nation. A country is as strong, healthy and united as the life of its people. A sound home makes a sound farm, a home where everybody in the family plays his part.

GOOD NEIGHBOURING: We will be good neighbours. Neighbouring is the secret of our democracy. Now is the time to bring that spirit back. We need each other today. "Each man for himself" will not build the community or Canada we want. Neighbouring means sharing our tools and our time, knowing our neighbours' needs and doing our best to meet them.

END PRIVATE WARS: We will end all private wars. Honest apology starts teamwork. National unity begins when you and the fellow you don't get along with straighten things out. Unity between the nations will only come through the same spirit.

END WASTE: We will be thrifty in the kitchen, the cash-box, the machinery shed, the barns, the fields, the orchards and the forests. OUT TO GIVE — NOT TO GET: Whatever we do we will always think first of what we can give to the nation rather than what we can get from it.

GUARDIANS OF NATIONAL CHARACTER: We farmers of Canada are guardians of the nation's character as well as of her soil. We shall have Dominion from sea to sea "was the vision of the Fathers of Confederation. With our dependence on God, we can make that vision live again as the secret of Canada's strength.

There are severe penalties for failing to make Unemployment Insurance Contributions for your insured employees and for failure to renew the Insurance Books as required.

If you are an insured person protect your benefit rights by seeing that your Insurance Book has been exchanged.
