If You Employ Male Person Have they all complied with the Military Call-Up?

By an Order signed under authority of the National Selection Service Mobilization Regulations: 5 Every employer of male employees must make an examination of the documents of these employees, and forward advice those who fail to produce documents showing good standium der Mobilization Regulations.


