Founding the Chronicle in Dunn-ville Forty-eight years ago, W. A. (Bill) Fry gained steadily from a small beginning, until he became one of the most widely known men in the Dominion of Canada. While he gained an estimable position in the publishing business, he was probably better known as a sportsman. He held the presidency of the Ontario Hockey Assocation, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada at different times in his career. His at currerent times in his career. His association with sport took him to Europe on two occasions with Canadian Olympic teams, and to the U. S. meet at Los Angeles in 1932. In all his travels he publicized his home town of Dunnville and the County of Haldimand. It is doubtful if any other citizen of this county was ever other citizen of this county was ever
