Training Schools Set Pace In Victory Loan Campaign

Jarvis And Dunnville Air
Schools Have Exceeded
Original Quotas

No. 1 Bombing & Gunnery School and No. 6 S.F.T.S. have already exceeded their Sixth Victory Loan objective. Jarvis trainees have subscribed \$110,500.00 or 111% of their objective of \$90,000. Dunnville with \$80,000 have 100% of their objective. The Hagersville school is not far behind with \$70,000 out of an objective of \$60,000.

This amazing record established by the Training Schools makes the duty on the civilian front perfectly clear. Surely if the boys on servicemen's pay so clearly recognize their duty, then those on the civilian front can offer no excuse, save buying Victory Bonds with every last cent at their disposal.

In the five canvassing districts in the county, the loan in the first three days slightly exceeded the subscriptions for the same period in the fifth loan. There is generally a tendency to buy, but there are still many who take only such amounts as convenient without undue strain on the purse strings. This of course, makes the canvassers job a difficult one and it is apparent that the civilian buyers do not yet fully appreciate the importance of buying bonds.

BACK IN CANADA

News of the arrival back in Canada of F.O. George Parkinson was happily learned on Saturday. He arrived in Waterford where his wife and daughter are making their home on Saturday night. On Sunday he called on a few relatives in this district before returning to Ottawa to report on Monday morning.

It has been held as a possibility that he would be returned to Canada since his thrilling experience on July 14th last, when the plane he was in "ditched" in the English Channel on a return flight to Berlin. F.O. Parkinson and his crew mates arrived safely in England after a thrilling rescue.

He enlisted for service in 1940, and went overseas late in 1942. He is hopeful that a furlough will be granted him shortly so that he may be enabled to spend some time in his home district.
