THE CANADIAN Government's monetary policy during the war has been generally approved by all serious minded citizens. This is been borne out by the consistent success of Victory Loan appeals and War Savings through stamps and certificates. The people of Canada have fully realized that Canada's future would be prejudiced if everyone aspired to secure goods and services that because of wartime demands are in short supply and secondly that the available money they will have in reserve will secure for them better goods when industry reverts to peacetime practises again, and also that their spending then will provide a measure of employ-

ment that will be badly needed. But there is a danger ahead. The European phase of the war may possibly end soon. Some may consider an armistice with Hitler, the signal to let loose on their spending. That would be disastrous. There is a war in the Pacific to be won, and even after that it will take time to revert Industry to peacetime operations. The war against inflation must be carried

on for some time after all military phases of action cease.


