

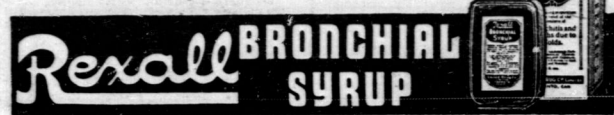

On the Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

If you are interested in poultry and poultry and egg production you will want to attend one of the special series of two-day poultry meetings being held in Haldimand county during the month of January. A most interesting program has been arranged and everything possible is being done to make the meetings a success.

The first of the series opens at Byng on January 2nd and will continue on the 3rd. These meetings will be held in the Township Hall and are for the Dunn and South Cayuga territory. The Inman Road meetings open on January 4th and continue on the 5th for the Moulton and Sherbrooke areas. The latter meetings will be held in the community hall at Inman Road. Ladies are especially invited and everyone keeping even a small farm flock should attend.

The work of the British farmer should be an inspiration to us all. In spite of a labour shortage, just as acute as our own if not more so, the farmers in Great Britain have been able to increase their production enormously. Latest official figures just released on last year's yields show that three million acres were sown to wheat or an increase of 82 per cent over 1939. The total yield was 117 million bushels as against sixty-one million in 1939.

Like-wise the British farmer increased his oat production from 131 million bushels in 1939 to 201 million in 1944; Barley from 41½ million to 51½ million and potatoes from 5¼ million tons to 9¼ million. This is an achievement of which all must be very proud.

Large quantities of Ontario winter wheat are milled into flour for a special trade with the West Indies and such markets. At the moment there is what appears to be a shortage of this type of wheat at the mills. Haldimand farmers should investigate the possibility of exchanging their winter wheat for No. 4 Western. This can be done to advantage and even when trucking charges have been taken off there still remains a nice profit on each bushel. More important still we want to hold this outlet for our Canadian wheat and the only way this can be done is to see that a steady flow of the product reaches the ultimate consumer.

Doesn't the same principle apply in the marketing of all our farm products? It is feared that in the past we have been too often a bit too independent and sold our product when we wanted to rather than when the market wanted it or could absorb it. A steady flow is what the consumer looks for and the sooner we realize that the better. In the case of perishable products such as poultry and eggs this means storage facilities.

Latest official figures place the total value of the 1944 crop of fall wheat, oats, barley and mixed grains in Haldimand at \$1,411,757. That sounds like a lot of money but when it is recalled that 61,496 acres were involved it gives a gross return of \$22.97 per acre. Furthermore it must be remembered that these are gross figures and not net profit.

A fact that we sometimes do not realize is the importance of our hay crop. This is emphasized by the latest crop value figures. These show the total value of the alfalfa, hay, and clover crop in this county to be \$1,945,725. This represents 65,842 acres and gives an average of \$29.47 per acre or exactly 50 cents per acre more than the grain crops. For the second month in succession Haldimand has gone over the top in butter production. The statistics for November reveal that 177,083 pounds were produced as against 106,209 pounds in the same month last year. On the total eleven month production, however, we are still 242,966 pounds short of equalling the 1943 production during the same period.

Up to December 13th 24,750 head of cattle from 1573 herds had been tested in the T.B. Area test. Of this number 653 or 2.63% were turned out as reactors from 206 or 13.09% of the herds. The total compensation allowed was \$21,202.00 or an average of \$32.46 per head.

On the sixty day retest which is applied to those herds having reactors in the first test, sixty-six herds have been completed. Twelve of them had a total of forty-one reactors.

A short time ago I received two copies of the Record, last week, just before we moved three hundred cigarettes came through and then yesterday came a box of gum from you. I know I should have written before, but things always seem to be in such a mad, hectic rush that it just didn't get done. We moved up into Belgium, near Ghent last week, and it is a very nice part of the country. The trains are running here as always, electric lights are on, and factories are working.
