# By-Law No. 77

## The Village of Jarvis RESPECTING DOGS

The Council of the Corporation of the Village

1. Everyone who owns, possesses or harbors a dog in the Village of Jarvis shall pay to the Village Clerk.

(1) for a male dog, if only one is kept ....... \$3.00

(2) tor each additional male dog ...... \$5.00

(3) for a female dog, if only one is kept .... \$6.00 (4) for each additional female dog ......\$0.00

on or before the 15th day of February in each year and upon payment of the said tax the Village Clerk shall de-liver to such person a tag and such person shall keep the tag securely fastened on the dog at all times during the year and until he procures a tag for the following year, excepting that the tag may be removed while the dog is being lawfully used for hunting deer in the bush.

2. A fee of 25c shall be charged for each tag.

3. The tag shall bear a serial number and the year in which it was issued and a record shall be kept by the Clerk or other Officer designated for that purpose showing the name and address of the owner and the serial number of the tag.

4. Every dog which is found off the premises upon which it is habitually kept, without a tag and not under the control of any person, may be killed.

5. No person shall own possess or harbor a dog in the Village of Jarvis unless the tax required by this bylaw has been paid nor shall any person allow any dog owned or possession by him or harbored by him to run at large in the Village of Jarvis without a tag securely

6. Any person guilty of a breech of any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty imposed by by-law No. 43-A of the Village of Jarvis and the said penalty may be imposed in the manner provided by said by-law No. 43-A of the Village of Jarvis.
