By-Law No. 77

The Village of Jarvis Respecting Dogs

The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis enacts as follows:-

- 1. Everyone who owns, possesses or harbors a dog in the Village of Jarvis shall pay to the Village Clerk:
(1) for a male dog, if only one is kept \$3.00
(2) for each additional male dog \$5.00
(3) for a female dog, if only one is kept \$2.00
(4) for each additional female dog \$9.00

on or before the 15th day of February in each year and upon payment of the said tax the Village Clerk shall deliver to such person a tag and such person shall keep the tag securely fastened on the dog at all times during the year and until he procures a tag for the following year, excepting that the tag may be removed while the dog is being lawfully used for hunting deer in the bush.

2. A fee of 25c shall be charged for each tag.
3. The tag shall bear a serial number and the year in which it was issued and a record shall be kept by the Clerk or other Officer designated for that purpose showing the name and address of the owner and the serial number of the tag.

4. Every dog which is found off the premises upon which it is habitually kept, without a tag and not under the control of any person, may be killed.

5. No person shall own, possess or harbor a dog in the Village of Jarvis unless the tax required by this by-law has been paid nor shall any person allow any dog owned or possession by him or harbored by him to run at large in the Village of Jarvis without a tag securely fastened on the said dog.

6. Any person guilty of a breach of any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty imposed by by-law No. 43-A of the Village of Jarvis and the said penalty may be imposed in the manner provided by said by-law No. 43-A of the Village of Jarvis.

Passed in Council this Fifth day of February 1935.

Dirk Van Ooyan, Son-in-Law Of Leonard Tyrrell, Missing

Family of 3 Small Children Reside With Grandparents In Walpole

CAPT. W. J. HOLLEY RETIRED FROM CHAPLAIN SERVICE

Capt. W. J. Holley, after spending some time in hospital, has been retired from the Canadian Chaplain Service on medical grounds and is returning to his former circuit at Old Windham at the beginning of February.

Capt. Holley entered the Chaplain Service in the Pacific Command in December 1942 and served as Chaplain and Educational Officer with the Royal Rifles of Canada Regiment and later as Brigadier Chaplain and Educational Officer to the 21st Canadian Infantry Brigade.

Dirk Van Ooyan 31, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Tyrrell, of Walpole, and husband of their only daughter, Winifred, of Montreal, was officially reported missing in a telegram received by Mr. and Mrs. Tyrrell on Sunday.

Van Ooyan, who is a native of Holland, came to Canada in 1921, before enlisting in the R.C.N.V.R. at H.M.C.S. Star in Hamilton in February 1941, he was a tobacco grower on the farm of Albert Hagerman on the ninth concession just west of Simcoe.

During his training period he was twice injured, once suffering a broken leg. During his three years of service he was awarded the Atlantic many times and on one occasion narrowly escaped death when his ship was hit by a German U-boat in the Atlantic. His mother still resides in Holland and he has only heard from her on one occasion since the Nazi invasion of the low countries.

Since his enlistment his wife has been engaged in war work in Montreal and their three children, Cora 7, Billy 6 and Bunny 4, have been with their grandparents in Walpole. The oldest attend school at S.S. No. 3, Walpole.

The information received in the telegram on Sunday gave no other advice, other than he was missing and that a letter would follow. Every hope is held by the anxious family for his safety.

E. Coupons For Tea-Coffee

Tea-coffee coupons 28 and 29, become valid for use beginning January 27 and they are the last coupons marked tea-coffee in Ration Book 3.

After that E coupons will be used for tea and coffee. Coupons E-1 and E-2 will become valid February 7.

They will have the same value as the coupons marked tea and coffee. Every 1/2 pound of coffee or 2 ounces of tea.

E coupons 1 to 6 will be used for Ration Book 3 before Ration Book 4 comes into use.

Ration Book 3 as issued to children under twelve years old contains E coupons. E coupons 1 to 6 in children's ration books must not be used for tea or coffee.

Children's books must contain these E coupons when application is made for the next Ration Book (No. 4).
