With the R.C.A.F. Bomber Group in Britain "No bombs crash down on enemy targets in the night fighters go screaming to earth in a flaming dye as their gunners draw a bead."

For young Canadian airmen shortly to embark upon operations against the enemy, the "Con Unit" or Heavy Conversion Unit, as it is known officially — is minus the familiar, apart from association with highly-experienced young veterans who, their own tours finished, serve there as instructors. Each of the several conversion units in the Canadian Bomber Group can boast more gallantry awards than most squadrons, largely because the best men are selected for their operational duties there after they have finished their tours. Upon their return to Canada they are assigned to the "Con Unit" and are responsible for training the young men who are to be sent to the front.
