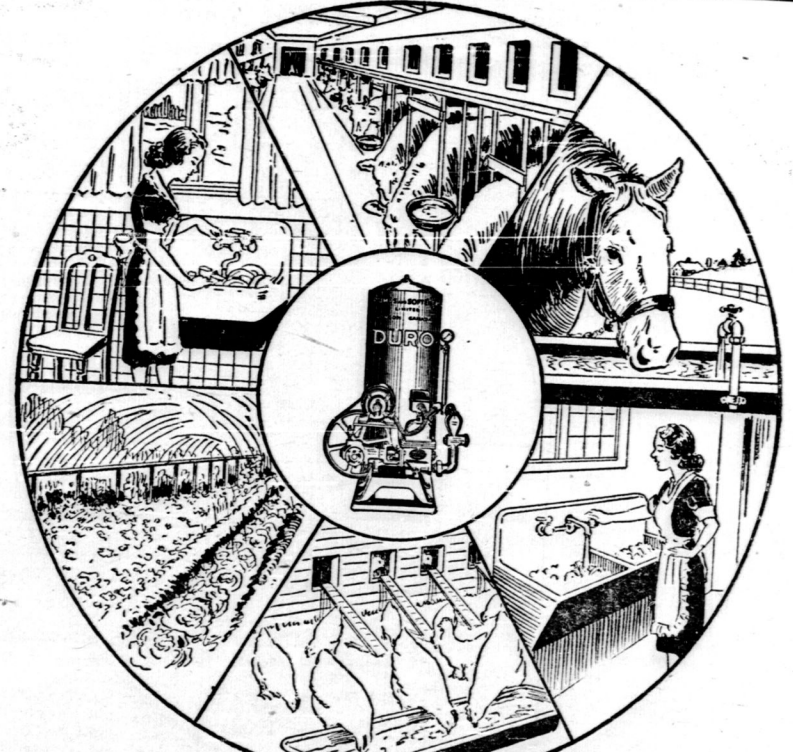

July 19 - (CP) - The re-announcement that large quantities of wheat will be released to the relief program of the United Nations is an indication that the Canadian government is looking towards the work of the Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.
There are 270,000 new bales of farm machinery in Canada which supply the products to the United States. This is the contribution of \$77,000,000 which has made toward the relief of the whole world.

Baby Bonus Puzzles Ottawa

The census of 1941 suggests Canada are taking a risk on that — the deficit in 1944 has somewhere between 3% and 3 1/2 million children, and what's that to a nicely classified national pay roll for babies?

And some thing like 100,000 to 150,000 of these young persons under 18 years of age are in gainful occupation, 50,000 of this total in reportable industrial employment. There are 270,000 new babies in Canada a year. And, 6,000 babies come double — twins; only about 75 come from Ottawa.
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Loses Life When Plane Shot Down After Sinking Sub Was On Routine Flight

Flight Sergeant Harry C. Leatherdale of Jarvis, who lost his life at sea on June 23rd, met his death when the plane in which he was a crew member was shot down after it had attacked and sunk an enemy submarine.
Information to this effect is contained in a letter received at Jarvis by his wife, the former Eleanor Osborne, from the Commanding Officer of R.C.A.F. Leatherside Squadron, Squadron Leader W. F. Poag, R.C.A.F. Iceland.
The letter reads as follows: "It is with deep regret and sincere realization of your loss and our country's loss, in the recent death of your husband, that I write this letter."
"Harry, as he was known to the boys in Leatherside Squadron, was one of the most capable men in his trade. He was quiet but very popular and well-liked by all the fellows in the squadron."
"Your husband went on his last flight with a clear conscience and no knowledge of impending disaster. The crew attacked and sank an enemy submarine, but were shot down and landed in the ocean. Death came quickly and without pain. His body was never recovered."
"The whole squadron join with me in expressing our deep sorrow in the untimely death of your husband."
