The campaign in Normandy Ine campaign in Normandy long-awaited second-front operation now about six weeks old — may appear to be moving slowly, but most military men agree with General Montgomery's recent statement in a broadcast address to his troops: "Our gains have been definite and concrete."

Since D-day, gains now may be summarized in this fashion:

1. The Allies came ashore with far fewer casualties than they were prepared to suffer, in an operation that could have been a catastrophe if the vaunted Eisenhower luck had turned bad; 2. Once ashore, they pushed inland and established a firm beachhead, cut sharply to the right in the opening weeks of the drive, and seized
