Full Amount Must Be Paid By April 30th, or Interest Charge Will Be Added.

DIFFERENT SYSTEM THAN LAST YEAR Many citizens are now securing their income tax forms which must be filed not later than April 30th, at which time the full amount of the tax due must be paid according to the Income Tax Department.

To many taxpayers the amount to be paid may seem higher this year than last, the reason for this, however, is that on March 31, a new plan was put into effect, the "pay-as-you-go-plan."
