WHAT GEORGE BERNARD SHAW HAS TO SAY ABOUT IT-

WHEN an institution is found to be unjust and anti-social, the popular reaction to the discovery is not to alter or discard the institution, but to injure those who profit by it. And when an obnoxious government is overthrown the first impulse is to liquidate all its functionaries and replace them with congenial

Both policies are disastrous. Their results in Russia in the few years which followed the revolution of 1917 were terrible enough to warn us off any attempt to repeat them here. Nevertheless, it seems quite probable that we shall repeat them all, and learn from experience it an appalling cost, what we are incapable of learning from history.

We are, for instance, facing an irresistible drift of economic changes from absolute private property ("real" property) to public property, from Cobdenist private capitalism to Fascist state-aided capitalism, from freedom of contract to state-regulated trade, from competition to co-operation and Communism, and from the wildest and most disruptive inequalities of income to a more stable equality. Such changes, unless very carefully, wisely and gradually guided, may smash up civilization.

Yet the first notion of their advocates is to reduce every exploiter or beneficiary of private erty and private enterprise to destitution. The Bolsheviks, convinced that private property in land is a baneful institution, took the successful farmer, the Kulak, by the scruff of his neck and threw him out into the lane to beg. The inevitable result followed: the farm ceased to produce anything but weeds and desolation; and Russia began to starve. Lenin soon had to pick up the Kulak out of the ditch - what was eft of him - and pitchfork him back into his farm with instructions to cultivate and exploit t for all he was worth until the Soviet was

ready to take on his job. The moral is clear. It may be finally desirable to get rid of landlordism; but while we have landlords let us have rich ones, and encourage them to become richer, rather than poor and persecuted ones. And what applies private farming enterprise applies to all enterprises. Lenin had to rehabilitate the trader just as he had to rehabilitate the Kulak. Colective farming and collective trading may come in time; but meanwhile the more private farming and trading flourishes the better for every-Dukes are better landlords than needy

A TURNING POINT OF EMPIRE-

NOW in all these discussions of future Empire policy, where does the average Canadian fit in? What part does he have in helping Canada choose the path that she will take? a simple one. As a free country, either we decide to throw our weight on the side of the moral law, or we decide to accept a modern version of the law of the jungie, clothed in all its up-to-date terminology of national prestige and ecodomic self-interest, and go down the road to another dark age.
Our statesmen and ambassadors can put

their signatures to impressive looking docu-ments, but it is the ordinary person that must make them work. It is not the declaration of statesmen that will build a new world. It is the day living of the ordinary man that will do - whether or not, in fact, he decides to live out the implications of the moral law in his own

There are few today who have not, at some time, pointed their fingers with scorn at the socalled appeasers who sat on the political plat-forms of those fateful years of the thirties. But all too many forget that their appeasement with the moral law in international questions was the direct result of our appeasement with the moral law in home and business. No wonder, at a time when the divorce rate was going up, the birth rate going down and ruthless selfaggrandisement the accepted practice in business, that internationally we failed to stand by our obligations to other countries. We did not have the moral courage to stop what we knew was wrong and do what we knew was right in international questions, simply because we were not doing it in the every day issues in business and family at home.

The only answer to a world gone crazy is people who have become sound. These questions, that involve the destiny of nations for years to come, cannot be decided by statesmen and politicians alone, the answers must well up out of the deep convictions of the ordinary person. They are the ones, in the final count, that must choose whether Canada follows "weather-cock" policy determined by the fickle breezes of national self-interest, or whether as a nation we decide to throw our every resource in the battle for the supremacy of moral laws

and values.
