MUNICIPAL SERVICE

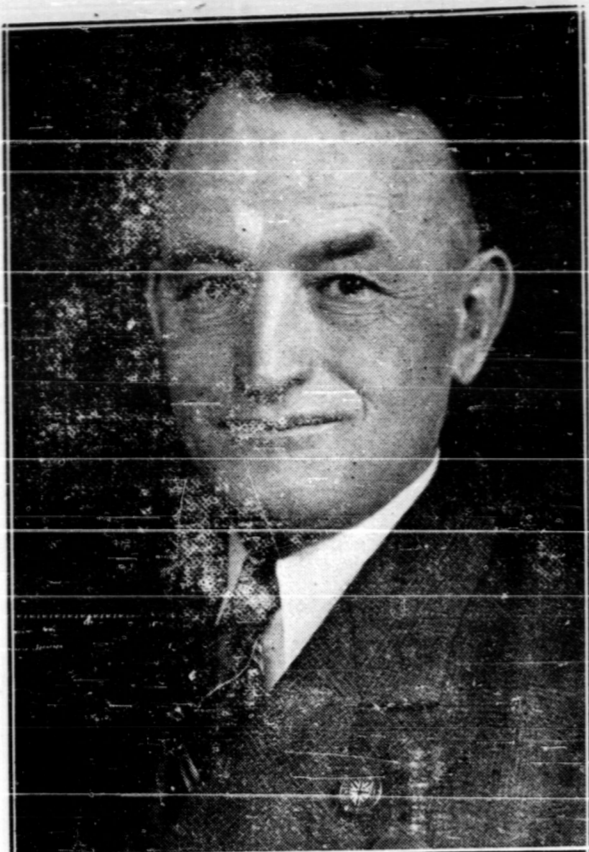

these and they may as well be forwarded now. Do it today. The feed supply in a lot of barns is alarmingly low. The labour situation on many farms is acute. A partial solution to these problems can be found in providing better pastures for our stock. It is good business to make the pastures yield the highest possible poundage of good feed. It is equally good business to make the stock harvest that feed themselves and thereby save manpower and machinery.

There would seem to be three basic principles involved in the production of better pastures. They are, first, improvement of the soil as soon as possible. There is nothing to be gained by retaining

Seasonal labor will remain as one of the most serious problems facing the farmer during 1944. A ray of hope was shed at the Corn Day last week when Mr. W. Davidson of the National Selective Service predicted a slight easing of the situation. He did not say there would be any help to go around but he did stress the grave responsibility of the farmer in making his labor needs known to the Selective Service officers at once.

In planning for seed supplies for 1944 the question of how much to sow to the acre has come up. This point is also raised as a result of the oral opinion seems to be that 2 1/2 to 3 bushels per acre. There does not seem to be any advantage in heavier seeding and one is running the risk of a "thin" field with light seeding. The generally accepted rate for barley is 2 bushels.

The importance of salt in the diet of all farm animals is often overlooked. It must be fed regularly just as lubricating oil must be supplied consistently to a machine. Salt is continually being given off. For every two grams in each pound of perspiration. Cows give a gram in every pint of milk. A gram in salt put into each egg and sheep use salt in the production of the fleece.

Of all classes of live stock swine suffer most from lack of salt. Canadian tests show that pigs fed 2 1/2 to 20 per cent more gain than a check group given 1 per cent salt in the feed. The fat and meat was firmer in the heavier salted hogs. In one pound of fine salt (iodized) into each 100 pounds of mash.

Another interesting feature is that the feeding of salt to young chicks has been found to control cannibalism. Dissolve a tablespoonful of salt in one gallon of water. Give for half a day on three alternate days; for example, a half day of Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The need for soil building is no new problem. Many of our farms have been cleared for 75 to 100 years and intensive cropping since then has reduced fertility reserves to the point where these will have to be replenished at increasing rates as time goes along. The only proper way to apply fertilizer is in accord with the soil analysis. Soil tests can be made for you free of charge and they most certainly indicate the kind and amount of fertilizer needed.

If You Employ Male Persons
Have them all comply with the Military Call-Up?

Under an Order signed under authority of the National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations:
1. Every employer of male employees must make an examination of the documents of these employees, and forward advice on such matters to the nearest Selective Service Office and ask for the booklet.
2. This examination must be completed by May 1st, 1944.
3. "EMPLOYER'S GUIDE" includes industrial and commercial employers, and also farm operators.
4. "EMPLOYER'S GUIDE" includes all male persons working for you, including relatives.
5. A booklet, "EMPLOYER'S GUIDE," has been sent to industrial and commercial employers. A return post card has gone to farm operators.
6. If you employ any male person, and have not been notified of the survey by booklet or post card, contact the nearest Employment and Selective Service Office and ask for the booklet.
7. Facilities are provided for failure to carry out this examination, and for male employees failing to assist by refusal to produce documents.
