On the Farm Front

— BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER —

— "If Your Soil Could Talk To You" is the title of a valuable little booklet which recently came our way. It is a pity that every farmer who aspires to successful management of his farm could not read this digest of available information on the best management of manure. One thing is certain, the authors are definitely in favour of manure being put back on the land.

How does manure benefit the soil? In reality its effect is not only chemical but physical as well. For instance, it is improved and fills more effectively. The soil is matured. The water-holding power of the soil is strengthened, and how very important this is in a dry year. Moreover, the soil works easier as demonstrated by an Experiment Station which found that it required one-fourth less power to draw a plow in a clay soil containing 2 1/2 per cent humus as compared with the same type of soil containing 2 1/4 per cent humus.

In other words, one percent of humus supplied by manure can cut the power requirement by 25 per cent if a soil in Haldimand County could talk, it could say "Give me manure to supply nitrogen, phosphate, potash and organic matter with which to humus."

In hog feeding, it has been demonstrated that and again that about 1000 pounds of barley or wheat (both having equal feeding values) in the form of other feeds are sufficient to raise a market hog to 200 pounds live weight. This is not low by any means. At the Test Station, a hog on a ration of 5.5 pounds of feed per pound of gain. On this basis, 700 pounds will produce a 200 pound hog in a season for the farmer.
