**PIONEER CITIZEN WILL MARK 90TH BIRTHDAY SATURDAY**  
Three score and ten is the normal span of life, but a few of harder stock reach the four score and ten mark, showing few scars of a life that has not always been travelled under the benefits of modern civilization as we know it today. William Williamson, a pioneer of the Jarvis community will reach his 90th birthday on Saturday, and his recollections of changes in the intervening years since his birth, would provide interesting history.

William Williamson came to this country as a mere youth of seventeen years. He left the warmth of his Scottish home near Perth, to face the pioneering hardships in Canada. Like many other Scotchmen, he made a real contribution to Canadian life. Although quiet and retiring by nature, he possessed the fundamental attributes of a good citizen.

He first started to farm where Mr. Roy Butler now resides on No. 3 Highway. He later purchased the farm now owned by Mr. C. H. Honey, and constructed the buildings for the present farm. He also farmed for ten years in the Adair district before buying the farm where he now resides in retirement with his son, Earl.

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

Haldimand farmers lose over a quarter of a million dollars every year through failure to take adequate care of their manure pile. Manure is worth money — real money — and yet we permit an average loss of 20 per cent in its value to take place. Based on a value of 12 1/2c per pound for nitrogen, 6 1/2c for phosphorus and 5c for potash, 10 bags of manure has an actual cash value of \$27. At the same time we see farmers selling this valuable plant food for a dollar a ton and sometimes even less.
