Canadian butter production in the first four months of this year is nearly eight million pounds bethe output for the same perfod last year, and reserves must be built up for winter months, according to K. H. Olive, dairy administrator, Wartime Prices and Trade Board. (Butter coupons 69 and 63 were valid on May 18, but the pound of butter obtained with these coupons must last for three weeks until June 3.

.... Indications are that for the present at least, Canada has reached peak milk production. At the same time consumption of fluid milk has reached an all-time record with sales still increasing. Large sup-plies of evaporated milk are needed for infants and those living where fluid milk is unobtainable. Subare required for the pound of this product that goes in every prisonerof-war parcel and the requirements of our armed forces and ships' stores must be obtained from Canadian production. In addition, Mr. Olive points out, Canada has to meet the requirements of the new United Kingdom contract for 125 million pounds of cheese as well as provide cheese for the home

"Total demand for dairy products exceeds total supply, and it is the job of the Board to allocate available supplies in the way which will best meet nutritional needs," Mr. Olive emphasizes.

Trade figures just released here show that for the first two months of the present calendar year total Canadian exports to French possessions were \$6,156,000 as against only \$240,000 in the same period in 1943. Countries to which these were shipped included Morocco, Algeria, Corsica and Tunis. Free rance, represented by the French Committee of Liberation is included in five agreements which Canada signed recently in connection with granting of mutual aid by Canada to the Allied Nations.

Importation of new potatoes will not be authorized while 1943 domestic stock of good quality is available, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board has announced. Total storage charges which may be added for the period up to May 31 are 40 cents per 75-lb. container; 52 cents per 100-lb. container. The last storage increase which will be effective June 1, amounts to a to-tal of 50 cents per 75-lb. container and 65 cents per 100-lb. container.
