Ottawa, May 24 - (CP) - With many Canadians now paying income tax who must now pay more, more are not required to do so, more than ordinary interest is attached to income tax. The Minister of Finance, Mr. Bennett, has announced that Canada would amend "wrenchy" tax laws in the next year to do her share as a member of the United Nations.

Mr. Bennett said it would cost Canada about \$500,000,000 a week to maintain her army, \$30,000,000 a week to maintain her navy and \$20,000,000 a week to keep up the R.C.A.F. The production of war materials would cost approximately \$40,000,000 a week.

In the present fiscal year the federal treasury will deal with vast sums, probably exceeding \$7,000,000,000 of which more than \$5,000,000,000 represent the year's bills arising out of direct war expenses.
