

NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS AND THEIR MALE EMPLOYEES-

By an order signed on August 15th, 1944, by the undersign Minister of Labour under authority of

1. Commencing August 22nd, 1944, every employer is required to check the documents held by each newly engaged male employee, within 7 days of the employee's engagement, to determine if such employee found not to possess documents as engagement, to determine if such employee found not to possess documents as engagement, to determine if such employee possesses documents to show that he is in good standing under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, 1944 (that is, in relation to the Military Call-up);

4. Any male employee here referred to, is required by the Regulations to present his documents to his employer for purposes of inspection;

2. Every employer must report on Schedule 9 to the Registrar for his Mobiliz-

ation Division, concerning any employee found not to possess documents as referred to;

INCLUDES ALSO ANY FARMER OPERATING A FARM, WHO HAS A MALE PERSON WORKING FOR HIM;

3. Every employer is required similarly to check the documents held by each male employee now working for him, whose

By an earlier order, employers were required to check the documents held by their male employees, and to report by May 1st, 1944, on doubtful cases as well as cases where employees did not possess documents.

Employers are asked to remember that they do not report on men who do possess the necessary documents—only on those who fail to present documents for examination, or where there is doubt that the document
