ON THE RECORD

FOLLOWING the forceful ejection of a member of the audience from an Alberta meeting for using the short and ugly word and not apologizing in "five seconds," Mr. M. J. Caldwell spoke in the New Brunswick campaign.

On January 25, 1937, J. S. Woodsworth, C.C.F. leader in the House, said: "In the event of war, Canada should remain strictly neutral." In Toronto, in February, 1937, Mr. Caldwell himself said: "My son... came to me voluntarily and said... it was his determination to go to jail before enlisting."

Mr. Caldwell, in the House of Commons, on September 9, 1939, (after Munich and after the sinking of the Athenia) said: "Canada should be prepared to defend her own shores, but her assistance should be limited to economic aid and the sending of any expeditionary force."

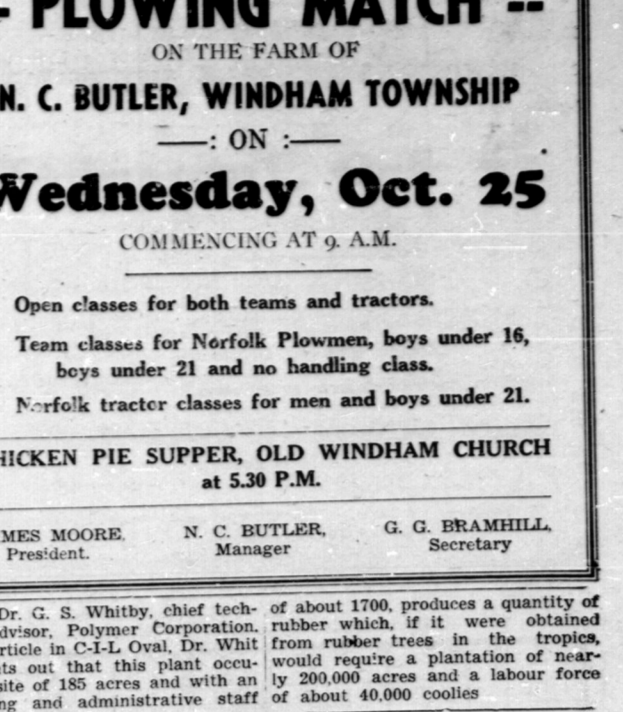
