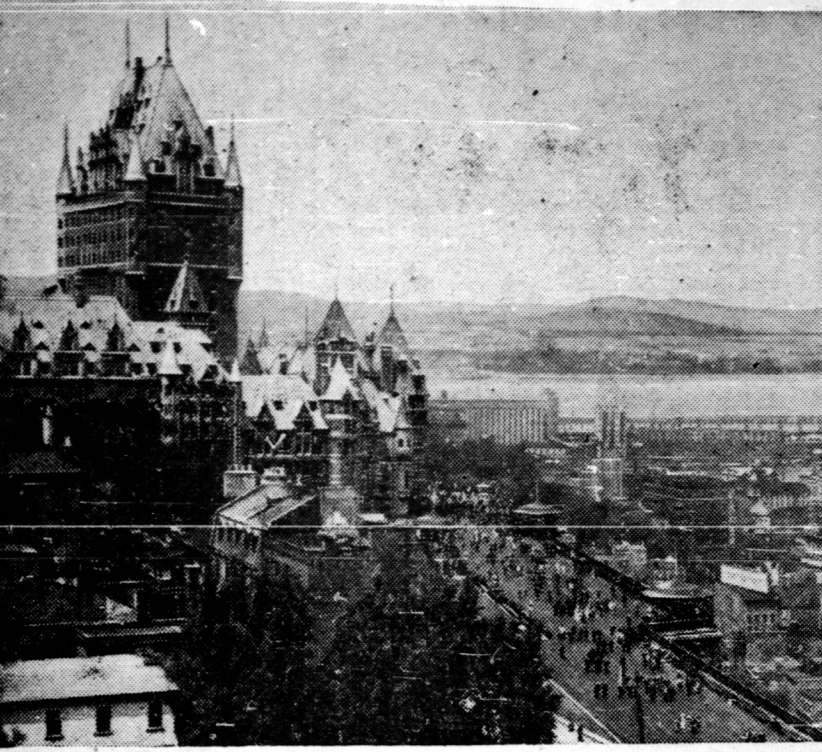

## Chateau Frontenac Again World War Center



Within the massive walls of the Chateau Frontenac and nearby Quebec Citadel, plans were laid over a year ago for the events which this year resulted in the invasion of Europe and its subsequent sweeping victory of France. Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Franklin D. Roosevelt, along with their chiefs of staff both military and political, conferred with such success in Canada's oldest city that now they are meeting again, and a little over a year later, today's plans have to do with final crushing of Nazi Europe, and the step-up of the next great task, elimination of the Japanese Empire as a world force.

During these days, the eyes of the world, United Nations, our enemies, and hundreds of thousands of peoples in still-bondaged Occupied lands, are focused on Canada and the figures which are shaping the world's destiny. It is a tribute to Canada and its people that this country has been chosen for a second conference, and the civilized world will await with patience and confidence the results that must surely accrue.

## Abraham J. Krouse Dies In Hamilton

Participated in Harness Racing For Many Years

Prominent farmer of the district and well known through his participation in harness racing at fall fairs for many years, Abraham James Krouse, who latterly had resided at 303 Emerald Street, north, Hamilton, died on Monday evening, September 13th at the Hamilton General Hospital in his Seventy-third year. Mr. Krouse farmed at Dundas until 1919 when he moved to Jarvis. He took up residence in Hamilton about two years ago. He was a native of Rockton, Ont.

Trotting and pacing horses were the only interests of deceased. He was a frequent patron of the various running horse tracks in the province and witnessed forty-one consecutive King's Plate contests at Toronto.

Predeceased by his wife, Mary Howard, several years ago, Mr. Krouse is survived by three sons, Howard of Dawson Creek, B.C.; Wilfred of Walpole township, and Lorne of Jerseyville, one daughter, Mrs. Sidney Thompson, of Konoka, Ont.; two brothers, Oscar, of Waterford, and Edgar, of Hamilton; two sisters, Mrs. Herbert Smith, Hamilton, and Mrs. Fred Cunningham, Dundas, and six grandchildren.

The funeral was held from the late residence to Jarvis United Church for service at 2:30 o'clock on Wednesday, burial took place in Oakwood Cemetery, Simcoe.
