A MERITORIOUS EFFORT—

WE KNOW of no man who contributes more to worthwhile projects, yet who can remain in the background with greater capability than Sam H. Morris, Publisher of The Port Dover Maple Leaf.

He seems to possess a positive detestation of plaudits cast in his direction. No matter what good deed is performed at his hand, he seems to feel that commendation is mere hypo-Yet on the other hand, let any citizen of his community perform a public service and he becomes eulogistic on their behalf.

What prompts these few lines is the "Jam For Britain Movement" which originated at Port Dover at the beginning of the war. Mrs. T. B. Barrett conceived the idea of sending the wasting fruits of Norfolk County to the people of England, and throughout she has contributed to the plan without diminution of enthusiasm. But, the man who put the drive into the undertaking, and Mrs. Barrett would be the first to confirm this, was Sam H. Morris. Through the medium of his paper and his own selfless fervour, probably more of the latter, the Women's Institutes of Norfolk put up 11,500 pounds of Jam in the first year of the undertaking. He didn't just sit back in his editorial sanctum and encourage the project with the printed word, ut went out and directed and planned and brought the undertaking into its maximum in-His car travelled to the orchards and brought in the fruits that kept the jam kettles

The Red Cross has since taken up the project and it now extends the length and breadth of Canada. In 1942, 225 tons of jam was shipped for needy families in Britain. It takes little understanding to appreciate what this has meant to the welfare of the bombed victims in that war tired island.

It could be that the O.B.E. has been conferred for less meritorious service to the Empire.

FARM INCOME___

FOR EVERY DOLLAR that went into the pockets of farmers from gross farm income 1932, it is estimated \$4.56 will go into their pockets this year. This is taken from statistics covering the whole Dominion of Canada. It appreciated that in this section of Ontario the difference in farm income is not quite as distinct between 1932 and 1944, and too that farm costs will further shade the difference, but at the same time farmers are definitely more prosperous. It means an opportunity to reduce or completely write off indebtedness incurred during the depression years and in some cases to build up a reserve for the future.

Despite the recent bill providing for the stabilization of farm prices, with the Dominion purchasing farm products, if necessary, to maintain prices, the present prosperity level will not last. There can be no man made Utopia for

He is a capitalist and operates on of private enterprise. World conditions and world markets will determine his future prosperity as long as production ex-

VVVV GOOD ADVICE-

MR. ELLIOTT M. LITTLE broadcasted over the CBC network last Wednesday night and gave some mighty good advice to the people of Canada. He emphasized that Governnents are the people's business, and urged active participation in the affairs of the community. nce good Government is the responsibility of the Citizen, so are the character and quality of the political parties," he said. He then went on to suggest that each individual take this simple important step: "Join the local association of the political party of your choice. Attend its meetings......become informed.....exert an influence on the selection of the type of candidate who will ultimately stand for office."

A false and damaging concept of politics has been built up throughout the country. Many hold the view that even local riding associations are made up of a band of unscrupulous men and women, attempting by devious means some sinister motive. It is right in local riding associations, where we find our greatest weakness i Governments. It is because too few people associate themselves with the work of influencing and shaping of the policies which should originate in the constituencies. Because of this lack of interest and attendant publicity attached thereto, the representative of the riding is given no guidance whatsoever regarding the real wishes of the people. Democratic Government can only be at its best when the people come to realize their responsibility in connection with it and make their just contribution. They can only do that by aligning themselves with one of the political parties and take an active interest
