## Jarvis District Loan Workers Make Plans For 8th Campaign

REV. S. B. EAST 57 YEARS IN MINISTRY

Rev. S. B. East who has been the Minister in charge at Wesley United Church since 1940, when his son Stewart B. East left for overseas service, is the foreman of the Jarvis District Loan Workers. Rev. East began his ministry at the age of thirty-four, he was ordained after completing his education at Wesley College in Winnipeg, and during which course he carried off all scholarship honours.

Following the service last Sunday evening which was in charge of the Fireside Club of the Church, Mr. East was presented with two books in honour of his birthday which was observed on Tuesday, April 10. The presentation was made on behalf of the Fireside Club by A. L. Miller.

Mr. East is a member of the Jarvis District Loan Workers, a group of men who are working to make a creditable showing, and I am sincere when I say that the rest of the County took pride in the results of the last campaign in this district," continued Mr. East. "There is no question," he said, "that the success of the many controls instituted by the Jarvis District Loan Workers has been due to the drawing off of the investment of funds in Victory Bonds. In addition, it has given vast thousands a new outlook by virtue of becoming shareholders in the great Country."

Andy Anderson and Robt. Warburton, County Organizers both spoke briefly, asking for the same earnest co-operation given in past loans. Mr. Anderson pointed out that Bank Deposits at the present time indicated that citizens held savings deposits in excess of a \$2,000,000,000, the amount held in the First Loan. "The money is available," he said, "and it only remains for the salesman to sell the Eighth Loan to the people."

WEEKLIES BEHIND ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

The Senate of the University of Western Ontario at London announced on Friday the establishment of a school of Journalism at that seat of learning. The move followed steps taken at the last annual meeting of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association at Winnipeg. Mr. Hugh Temple of the Pergus News-Record has devoted a great deal of time to the project and has been given co-operation by the Senate of the University of Western Ontario.

Wages for a work day from seven A.M. until six P.M. will be turned over to the receiver-general of Canada after the war. The move was placed in the prisoner-of-war revolving fund and applied to the cost of P.O.W. camp administration. Fifty cents daily will be accredited to each man to be used in the camp kitchen.

Prisoner-of-war Camps to be Established in Norfolk County

An advisory committee has approved establishment of prisoner-of-war labor camps in southern Ontario at a meeting in Simcoe, Ont. The committee approved a wage rate of two thirds of the current farm wage rate plus transportation, with a suggested hourly wage of 35 cents.

Major Thompson Retiring Soon

Major Andrew R. (Drew) Thompson, gentleman user of the Black Rod, plans to retire from his duties in the House of Commons at the end of the present session of Parliament. A veteran of the first Great War, Major Thompson suffered from a severe attack of rheumatism which has gradually undermined his health, forcing him to give up his duties. His departure from Capital Hill will terminate a connection of the Thompson family in the life of the Government of Canada which goes back to the first Parliament, when the Major's grandfather, David Thompson, represented the riding of the North-West. The Thompson family, Col. Andrew T. Thompson, represented the riding of the North-West, and was widely known for jingling lamponsing the great at the turn of the century.

Major Thompson, whose duties are at present being performed by his assistant, O. H. Laro, never had to exercise his police authority in the dignified upper House during his twenty year term, although during that period his Commons counterpart, the sergeant-at-arms, was often called upon to escort meekly the members from the more argumentative chamber.
