All organizations interested in any of the problems related to public education are invited to submit briefs to



## A Message For Farmers

Canadian farmers are confronted with a rare opportunity to do some effective planning in their own interest and in that of the nation, W. D. Albright declared recently in Alberta. Canadian farm income, which reached a low of \$383,000,000 in 1932, has risen to \$722,000,000 in 1939 and to \$1,748,000,000 (estimated grossincome) in 1944. While a good deal of the jump is represented by price increase, volume has held up well. Every important wartime call upon Canadian farm production has been substantially met, or more than met, in spite of labour shortage and the shortage of new machinery. But while this magnificent record was being achieved the farm plant has been running down at heel, and that cannot go on forever. It is a good time for each farmer tosit down and carefully consider a definite plan for the future, looking toward the improvement of his farm enterprise, farm home, the future welfare of oility of setting aside something for a nest egg and keeping it as reserve against contingencies. Victory Bonds are the ideal means to these ends but it must be remembered that \$1.00 will not do the work of \$2.00. Each farmer must consider what he needs most. Perhaps it is a well or a dugout, or water on tap in the house, or a new barn, or a new house, or a new tractor, or some good stock. Make a list of the desirables and review it carefully.
