Reports of a substantial increase in Ontario butter production during the month of February, over that of last year, and of still further increase being likely in March, are contain ed in the summary of the creamery instructors' reports to the Ontario Department of Agriculture. The greatest percentage increase, the reports state, has been in Southwestern Ontario, but practically all parts of the Province share in the upward trend of production. Northern Ontario anticipates a much larger make of butter in March than was the case a year ago, the production of milk in the district having increased substantially.
