TO the writer of this letter and several thousand others who are in the same position, your Hydro can definitely say that your application for service certainly has not "slipped our mind." Everything that can be done is being done to serve as many new

Even though many regulations have been relaxed, and the war in Europe is over, there is little, if any, sign of improvement in the shortage of labour and materials.
