HYDRO RURAL SERVICE... WHEN?

To the Hydros,
Dear Sirs,
I am writing to ask when I am going to get electricity brought to my farm. You've had my application for some time and I was told that it had been approved. The Hydro wires pass my farm why then is nothing done about it?
Please let me know if this matter has slipped your mind, or do I get electricity?

TO the writer of this letter and several thousand others who are in the same position, your Hydro can definitely say that your application for service certainly has not "slipped your mind." Everything that can be done is being done to serve as many new customers as soon as possible.

Even though many regulations have been relaxed, and the war in Europe is over, there is little, if any, sign of improvement in the shortage of labour and materials. The shortage of only one of the many parts needed to complete a service results in a delay. The labour and materials available are being used with extreme care and planning to serve as many new rural customers as quickly as possible.

To those applicants in areas where Hydro lines are still to be constructed, Hydro service will be made available as the supply of labour and materials improves. Already sufficient applications have been received which will require the construction of over 2,000 miles of line that cannot be undertaken in 1945. However, your Hydro is making every effort to complete by the end of 1945 all applications made in 1944 that have been officially approved by letter.

Your Hydro has done and is doing everything possible to extend electricity to essential rural services. The Hydro rural service that you are waiting for will be completed just as soon as the labour and material situation permits.

Ottawa Sidelights

Ottawa, August 22 (CP) — The war is over and in this capital the mighty economic machine Canada built for the fight is being re-routed for the hard tasks of peace — the kind of a peace which Prime Minister Mackenzie King said must be based on the individual, on human brotherhood and co-operation.

Even while victory celebration paper still littered the streets the war machine was being torn down and a new one erected for the peace. No one had expected quite so soon. Some of the controls and restrictions which governed the lives of 11,000,000 Canadians through the war years were the first to go. And others will follow.

Just almost simultaneously with V-J Day were gasoline rationing, fuel oil restrictions, some sections of the Defence of Canada Regulations dealing with security and disaffection, all censorship regulations and restrictions on the manufacture of civilian cars and trucks by the end of this year.

But the permit regulations on distribution of these civilian machines remain and first models of the line will go to essential users. Going soon are a number of controls on manpower. Workers will no longer be frozen to their jobs after September 17th, the regulation under which men were not allowed to leave agriculture will be eliminated at harvesting of the 1945 crop and the power to direct men to work in agriculture will be eliminated, possibly about November 15.

No immediate change will be made in wage control orders and regulations are that plans for re-establishment of meat rationing in Canada early next month are going ahead despite reports from the United States that it may be rescinded there.

No Unemployment

At a hurriedly called press conference in his green-carpeted office on the eve of V-J Day, Prime Minister King said the government intends to make the change from a wartime to a peacetime economy as quickly and effectively as conditions permit and with as little interference to industry as possible.

One of the leading figures behind Canada's reconversion is Minister of Reconstruction, who will have much to do with the shaping of peacetime Canada. At a press conference he stated that he had a number of years' experience in the reconversion of the people accept the jobs that are available.

He gave figures showing 220,000 workers released from war industries since V-E Day May 8 and other figures showing despite these releases there was still an overall short shortage in Canada of about 120,000 and 140,000. On top of this there was a great backlog of \$300,000,000 worth of lower priority industrial activity being held back until there was an overflow of manpower and materials from high priority work such as housing.

One of the problems of reconversion he said was the scarcity of materials which in many cases resulted from a shortage of labor in basic industries such as textiles, foundries and lumber yards and brick works.

Nevertheless, the minister confirmed that he anticipated no real difficulty in the Dominion's changeover from war to peace.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HELD AT UNITED CHURCH SUNDAY NIGHT

A good crowd was in Wesley United Church on Sunday evening to participate in the service of Prayer and Thanksgiving which was arranged by the Jarvis Ministerial Association at the request of the Council of the Township of Walpole and the Village of Jarvis.

Rev. S. B. East had charge of the service and was assisted by Rev. H. Fuller, Knox Presbyterian Church; Rev. J. M. Cameron, St. Paul's Anglican Church; Rev. P. S. Baines, Nanticoke United Church; and Rev. Howard L. Roberts, of Brantford.

The service was opened with brief remarks by Rev. A. L. Miller. The combined choir under the direction of Miss Meta MacMurchy rendered the beautiful anthem "Te Deum Laudamus" and the male section of the choir rendered the anthem "Jerusalem".

The Minister in his address spoke of the atomic bomb and its destructive possibilities and said that he should be thankful that God in his mercy had given the secret to the Allied Nations rather than to the enemy.

"With the release of this great force," he said, "we are entering a new era and should pray for the Almighty to give us understanding."
