PUNISHMENT FOR CRIMINALS

IT CAN BE GATHERED FROM current comment that the sentences imposed by the Norfolk County Judge on four Windsor Bank Robbers last week were popular with the people. So far as Mr. John Public is concerned, his first reaction in such cases is that sentences cannot be too stiff. The fact that one of these men discharged his revolver dangerously close to the head of a customer in the Langton Bank at the time the robbery took place was enough to remove all feeling of compassion.

A Toronto writer however, in commenting on the sentence points out that "there is no humane person who, after reflection, will believe that lashes in addition to a long term of imprisonment are anything to recommend to the satisfaction of somebody's praiseworthy impulses. We should not be cruel to prisoners anyone than we should be cruel to each other. To do so is to injure ourselves and destroy what is left in the victims that can be destroyed."

The Editor of the Simcoe Reformer is glad to note that the County Judge intends to make Norfolk County an unhealthy spot for would-be criminals of every kind and says that "stern justice such featured the Norfolk Trial should be the portion of these thugs."

The Toronto writer apparently has no quarrel with the severity of punishment but differs as to the method employed. A local man suggests that the only possible way of dealing with men whose minds direct them to such misdoings is upon conviction to take them out and shoot them. If it became known to would-be bank robbers and others who prey upon the decencies of society that upon conviction of their crimes of society that they will be destroyed, the death sentence would be their lot, he contends that crime would be eliminated. Support of this argument is given in the statement of J. Edgar Hoover, Chief of the U.S. F.B.I., at an address this week, when he stated that the upswing in crime in that country is largely due to offenders who have been paroled for reason of good conduct, only to prey again upon society.

When a desperado carries a gun it means that innocent people's lives are at stake. Why then should these men not be made to feel a penalty at least equal to the consequences they would readily mete out to anyone with sufficient courage to stand in their way.

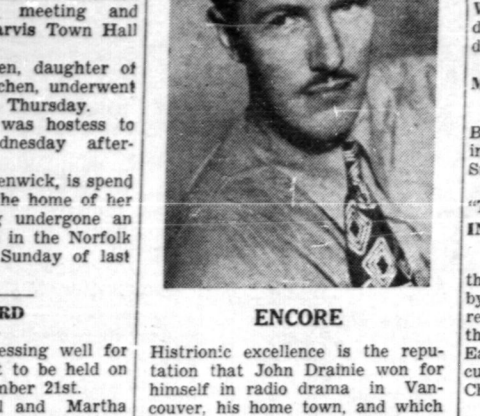

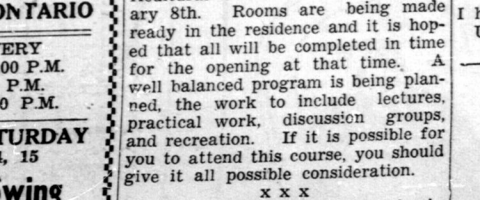

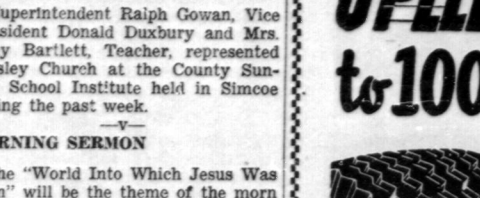
