

Toronto, December 11 (CP) — The Ontario department of education has just completed plans and called for tenders for an experimental rural central school at Utterson, near Bracebridge, which should do much to speed the little red schoolhouse, or romantic memory but poor planning, on its way out.

The school will embody the results of a combined investigation by experts into every modern development in school architecture, made for the Royal Commission on Education.

In contrast to the small, crowded, ill-ventilated country school of other years, the new model school will have ample space for school activities, plenty of light and air, hot water heating and all modern conveniences found in larger city schools.

While countries of the Old World are worrying about declining birth rates, Ontario is not having any worries along that line. Vital statistics for a 10-year period, 1933 to 1943, released by the provincial department of health, show that the birth rate increased from 18.1 to 20.7 per 1,000. At the same time maternal mortality was reduced fifty per cent and infant mortality nearly one third.

Live births increased from 63,645 in 1933 to 81,175 in 1943, latest year for which accurate statistics are available. In that period infant mortality was reduced from 59.6 per 1,000 live births to 40 in 1943. The maternal death rate was reduced from 5.4 in 1933 to 2.3 per 1,000 births in 1943, an all-time low.

The United Farmers Co-operative movement is extending its activities into the international field with plans being studied for co-operative associations with organizations in the United States, Britain and other countries.

The directors' report at the recent annual meeting in Toronto said they believed "that the co-operative idea on a world scale is a necessity if we are to avert the continuance of the tragic series of wars and depressions which has marked the first half of this century."

About 1,000,000 Christmas trees are being shipped to the United States from Ontario this year and agencies which operate reforestation areas under land and timber department direction will benefit to the extent of nearly \$500,000. Most of the trees are being sent from the Georgian Bay district.

Support of the trees fits in nicely with the province's reforestation plans because the trees are mostly Scotch pine. Little valued here commercially, Scotch pine is being steadily cleared out of county forests and is being replaced by red pine, more readily utilized industrially.

In a major advance for winter highway safety, the Ontario highways department has completed a plan designed to keep most-travelled highways open and in most cases, free of ice throughout the winter. The system is based on detailed twice-a-day weather forecasts, sent from road gangs to reach treatment areas before storms strike, and on extended use of chemicals to keep roads ice-free.

FARMERS REMINDED ON POULTRY PRICES

Farmers who raise poultry are reminded that all sales to retail merchants, as well as sales in bulk to industrial, commercial and other buyers who purchase through any pooling arrangements must not exceed the wholesale ceiling price. It is only when deliveries are made separately to individual addresses that the retail ceiling applies.

For example, Grade A Turkeys shipped in bulk to one address would be sold at the ceiling price of 39 1/2c, stated Mr. F. L. J. Seldon, Prices and Supply Representative, W.P.T.B., who pointed out that this was made clear in the Administrative Order. Wholesale prices for other grades, in effect from December 15th to December 31st (both dates inclusive) are as follows: Special 39 1/2c, Grade B 36 1/2c, Grade C 33 1/2c.

Butter Ration Cut From 7 To 6 Ozs.

Because butter production during November dropped 12.9 per cent compared with the same month in 1944 and because the winter months are in any case, a period of low production, Wartime Prices and Trade Board has announced a cut in the butter ration from 7 to 6 ounces per person per week commencing in January. The reduced ration will be in effect through the winter months and will be restored as soon as supplies permit, probably next April.

Similar reductions during the low production winter months have been made during each of the past three years. The cut will be spread over several months to avoid a more drastic curtailment or severe shortage later in the winter. No change will be effected in coupon values and the reduction will be achieved by skipping a coupon every fourth week instead of every eighth week, as is the case at present. The first coupon will be dropped on December 21st.

Up until November 1945 the trend in butter production had been approximately the same as during 1944 and it was thought that the production for each of the two years would be approximately the same. However, the very serious decrease during November reversed the trend and there is every indication that this downward trend will continue during the winter.

Stocks of butter on December 1st amounted to 51,796,171 pounds, a decrease of over 700,000 pounds compared with the same time in 1944.

THE TOWNSEND
