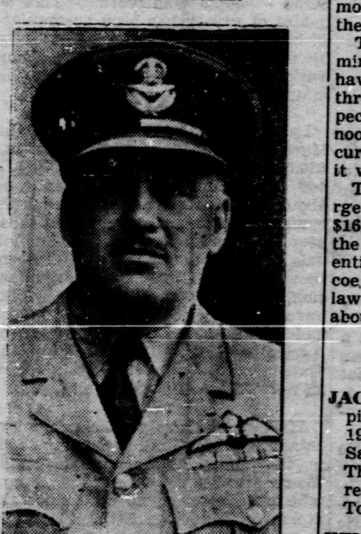

Further Honours have been awarded to the Padre from Jarvis according to the announcement made on Friday. He has been made a member of The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire. He is now with the Canadian Chaplain Services in Italy and is connected with the 48th Highlanders. His first served as a Lieutenant in the 41st Field Brigade and joined the Chaplaincy Service in July 1940. When he went overseas he was the active Minister at Wesley United Church here, and during his absence his father is carrying on his work. His wife, Mrs. Mary East resides at 39 Duncannon Drive, Toronto.  
Major East's record since the invasion of Sicily has been crowned with heroism. Stories direct from the front in which he serves have more than confirmed the tenacity of the stories of his courage and devotion to the boys in his unit.

## Near Disaster At Simcoe Arena

At one-thirty in the afternoon on New Year's Day the roof and sides of the Mason Arena in Simcoe collapsed due to the heavy weight of snow which had been building up for more than two weeks on the roof of the structure.  
The collapse occurred only a few minutes before the doors were to have been opened to admit some three hundred children who were expected to spend New Year's afternoon skating. Had the collapse occurred with the children on the ice it would have been a major disaster.  
The rink was built in 1911 by George Mason of Ingersoll at a cost of \$15,000. In 1913 three sections of the roof caved in at which time the entire building was reinforced. Simcoe ratepayers turned down a by-law to build an artificial ice arena about five years ago.

### Situation Growing Serious In Some Sections

A sweeping west wind which started late Monday afternoon gained in velocity through the night and again on Tuesday, completely blocking traffic on nearly all roads on Tuesday. The east and west highways to the north and south roads but there were delays on all highways.  
The County concessions are in the worst condition they have been in for many a year. While existing snow removal equipment is working night and day to keep the main arteries clear, they simply cannot keep up to nature which is having its way in a grand style in this winter season of 1944-45.  
The Nanticoke sidroad will soon be a tunnel from Nanticoke to No. 3 Highway. The most modern plows maintained at No. 1, Bombing and Gunnery School fought for hours on Tuesday and only succeeded in getting a narrow strip clear on this road late in the afternoon. No. 6 highway north of Jarvis was blocked until Tuesday afternoon, with the heaviest drifts just north of the Village. Several cars were stranded on No. 6 highway south through-out the day and it was seven o'clock Tuesday night before the big R.C.A.F. plow got through on this road to provide an outlet for supply trucks.  
The heavy snowfall this year has complicated matters at No. 1 Bombing and Gunnery School. It is there that the R.C.A.S.C. Supply Depot is located, which issues supplies to the Dunville and Hagersville, training Schools as well as the Army Camp at Simcoe. There have been several days now that the supplies could not get in to the depot and as a consequence the Training School have on occasion been precariously low on rations.  
The Mailmen on the rural routes have in one sense been enjoying a holiday since the severe storms started a few weeks ago with some being unable to traverse their routes at all. Yet on the other hand it probably would be a relief to them to be able to distribute their mail regularly rather than keep track of the volume that accumulates from day to day for the boxholders. John Nicol, veteran mailman covering concessions four and five in Walpole reports that he has been able to get most of his mail out by catching the farmers when they come in to town with their teams and sleighs for supplies.  
This generation will be able to relate with satisfaction to their grandchildren the big snow of the winter 1944-45.
