Dringing to 41 the awards for heroism which Canadian Pacific seagoing personnel has won in this war these officers have been honored by the King "for good services" in vessels from among the 20 Canadian Pacific ships taken over by the Admiralty since 1939.

They are from among the 4,488 company men now on Admiralty service, with an additional 1,010 on "Mont" ships being used as armed cruisers and 101 in shore posts, of the 18 ocean liners and fast-freighters and the two British Columbia Coast Service vessels in which they went to warnine have been announced as lost—two from the peacetime Pacific fleet, four from Atlantic runs and one from the coast service.

Three Officers of the Order of the British Empire, four Members of the same Ordea and three commendations for their actions under attack make up the latest list which foilows an earlier-sumbary showing 31 decorations and mentions in despatches.

Under this plan travelling super-visors and field representatives will be appointed to visit the trainee's regularly so that their progress may be followed and their rights protect ed, he said. Private trade schools

business colleges and similar insti-tutions of good standing may also be used under licenses granted by the Ontario Department of Education. Turning to academic training in connection with discharged veterans. Premier Drew said the special educa-tional courses at the rehabilitation centre already enjoyed a substantial enrolment and he expected the at-tendance to be five hundred. He added that one of the things which stimulates interest is the fact it is not necessary to wait until any fixed dates for examinations but they can be tried whenever the students are

ready.

The Rehabilitation Centre in Toronto comprised of fourteen schools is the first of a number of similar is the first of a number of similar training centres to be opened at key points throughout Ontario as the demand arises. All will be organized upon very much the same basis. "From the brief outline I have given it will be seen that both vocational and academic training is being given to veterans on a basis never before attempted in this country. The courses will be expanded as quickly as instructors and equipment become available. From what we have already been able to do it appears that we may get many use

we have already been able to do it appears that we may get many useful suggestions for the general educational program of the province. Out of the concentrated effort being made in these courses by older pupils it is likely that many useful lessons will be learned. pils it is likely that many useful lessons will be learned.

"In the work we have done we have already seen the need for personal guidance of many of those returning from overseas. It is not something which can be left in official hands alone, nor can the printed words of any act of parliament provide some magic formula to solve the personal problems of rehabilitation. It is a job which starts in the homes and goes right through our whole community life. I am not suggesting for a moment that every returning veteran is going to find it difficult to adjust himself in civilian life. But I know that many are and that in those cases it is very important that there be understanding wise guidance and practical help."

The highest average yield for any one club was 556 bushels per acre. This was in Cochrane District. The highest individual yield was in the samt club. Mr. Dave Hackett a member of the Cochrane Crop Improvement Association produced 683 bushels per sore. Haldimand's average is around 90.)
