SOUND GOVERNMENT-

It is quite apparent this view has begun to take hold in Ontario by virtue of the voting results on Monday. It is our sincere belief that Canada can best be served by a two party Government. We do not hold to the view that all politicians are grafters, nor that the old time partys, the grits and the tories, are decadent. All Canada needs is an aroused interest on the part of the people in the affairs of Government.
The Government in this country is the servant of the people and we should so regard it. If we are the servants of the Government it can only be due to our own lethargy.

RESPECTED EDITOR EXPOSES SHAM-

MR. GEORGE W. JAMES, editor of the Canadian Statesman of Bowmanville, is typical of life-long Liberals throughout the Dommion who are deserting their party because they cannot follow a leader who has played one section of the country against another, even in the midst of a world war.



1,200,000 FAMILIES have already registered for Family Allowances. Approximately 100,000 tamilies who ere entitled to register and who will benefit, have not yet registered.

Family Allowances cheques will be mailed in July. If you want to receive your first cheque, register now. If you delay your registration any longer, it may not be possible to deal with your application in time to send you the first cheque.

If you have children under 16 and if your income is under \$3,000 a year, you will benefit from Family Allowances. If you have not registered, and intend to do so, please act at once! Family Allowances Registration forms have been mailed to every family. They can be obtained at the nearest post office or by writing to the Regional Director of Family Allowances in the capital of your province.

FAMILY ALLOWANCES INCOME TAX

When the Family Allowances Act was passed, Parliament approved the principle that there should be no duplication of benefits by way of Family Allowances and Income Tax credits for the same child.

Family Allowances cheques will be paid in full every month. But for the last six months of 1945 an adjustment will be made to avoid duplication of benefits. The table below shows the effect of this adjustment and will enable taxpayers to determine the extent to which they will benefit from Family Allowances.

The BENEFITS: The Family Allowances Act was passed to help equalize opportunities for all children. The monthly allowances will assist in providing medical, dental and nursing services, better food, better clothing and shelter. Family Allowances are additional to dependents' allowances

for servicemen's families and military pensions. Furthermore, Family Allowances are NOT taxable. You do not add these monthly payments to your total income when computing your income tax.

In the column at left is an explanation of the relationship between Family Allowances and Income Tax deductions for children. From the table given you can determine quickly the extent to which you will benefit.
