

The Week in Ottawa

Ottawa, June 6. (CP). — Almost every day in Ottawa now break orders come from various government departments lifting or relaxing numerous wartime controls as Canada switches slowly from wartime to peacetime.

With an eye to Pacific war requirements, government spokesmen have announced these controls will be dispensed with just as soon as their necessity fades with the ending of the war in Europe. There will be some, however, that probably will remain until Japan is beaten and perhaps even after that.

During the past week Canadians were told they could get more gasoline for their cars, car manufacturers were given permits for 10,000 passenger vehicles this year and the planned production of new farm machinery and attachments was bumped considerably. There were other lesser control developments, but those were the main points.

A new Price Control order said that present indications are for an output of 130 per cent of the 1944-45 farm machinery production in the coming year. In addition all restrictions were lifted on the production of repair parts but the board said that rationing of farm machinery items in short supply would continue so as to ensure fair distribution.

Good News For Farmers

That was good news for the farmer for it was only last month that the board announced that production quotas on farm machinery would be equal to the 1944-45 production.

In the past quotas of farm machinery have been split, between Eastern and Western Canada. But under the new order each manufacturer and importer is now required to distribute to each province in proportion to its average sales in each

province in 1940, 1941 and 1942.

Word of the lifting of restrictions on the use of copper or other non-ferrous metals for rural electrification or other public utility services came during the week. In the words of the munitions department that means that public utilities can purchase without a permit non-ferrous metals for new installations and extensions of electric, gas, water, street car, sewage, telephone and telegraph service.

This is the signal was given to numerous Hydro and other utility projects planned by provinces and municipalities across the country.

Canada's Manpower

The labor department has announced that it is no longer necessary for a man on postment from military training or his employment to request a renewal of postment from mobilization registers and orders have gone out to that effect. But no man can leave an essential job.

Labor Minister Mitchell commented on the move and made particular reference to farmers. He said that "this year we must produce all the goods nature will provide and the labor department will spare no effort to see that Canada's overworked farmers who have done so splendidly in past years, are given the help of every available man. No men now in agricultural employment, according to existing law, may leave farming work without a permit from an employment officer, and all officers across Canada have been instructed to check any suggestion of a movement from the farms."

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics, which keeps its fingers on the pulse of many things, reported Canada's country store business during the week. It found that country general store sales averaged three per cent higher in April than in the corresponding month of last year. Retail sales in the country store business showed increases of six per cent in the Maritimes, nine per cent in Quebec, five per cent in Ontario, one per cent in Manitoba and six per cent in British Columbia. Declines of four and four per cent were reported for Saskatchewan and Alberta respectively. During the first four months of 1945, country store sales on Canada as a whole averaged 6.4 per

King Returned - Bare Majority

Haldimand Electors Return Veteran P. C. Candidate By Bare Majority - 1538 Votes

POPULARITY OF VETERAN PARLIAMENTARIAN IS AGAIN SHOWN BY POPULAR VOTE IN HALDIMAND

The popularity of Mark C. Senn, veteran M.P. for the constituency of Haldimand has never been expressed in a greater degree than in the voting which took place on Monday. Mr. Senn returned to Ottawa for the seventh consecutive time by the result of this riding, which has given him majorities on each occasion ranging from 719 to 1538. His majority this time topped the election in which he has participated. Mr. Senn first entered the House of Commons in 1921, in the same election that Mackenzie King was elected Prime Minister. In the campaigns of 1925, 1926, 1929, 1935, 1940 and again in 1945 he has been elected.

The vote in Haldimand was not particularly heavy with slightly more than ten thousand people casting their ballots, representing seventy-five per cent of the eligible voters. The Progressive Conservatives led in the balloting in ten of the fifteen municipalities. Jarvis, Hagersville, Cayuga, Dunnville, Seneca, Onondaga, Moulton and Canboro gave Senn a majority, while Walpole, South Cayuga, Sherbrooke, Rainham and North Cayuga gave a majority to Fraser Rainey, the Liberal Candidate. W. E. Jones, the C.C.F. Candidate ran a poor third receiving a total of only 336 in the entire riding.

The Town of Dunnville, gave Senn his strongest majority, there being 1301 against 612 for Rainey. Hagersville also gave Senn a majority of 156, which is a big turnover compared to the 1935 election when the Liberal party had a majority of fifteen votes there. Seneca also gave Senn a majority of 382 which was substantially larger than in the 1940 voting.

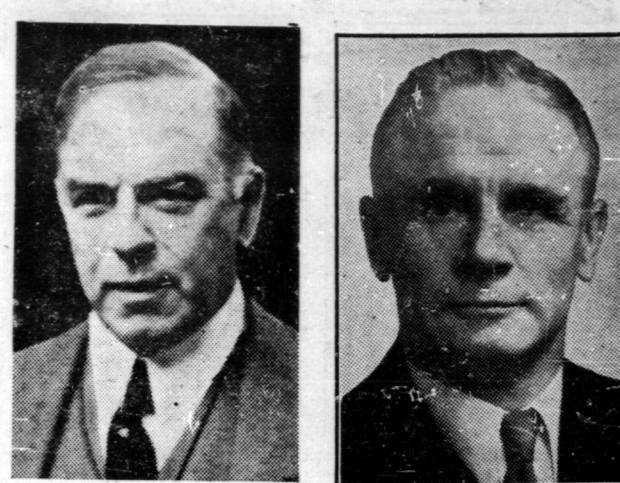
