ALL OUR YESTERDAYS-

WHEN THE APOSTLE PAUL wrote, "I die daily," he knew he was exaggerating; but there is a sense in which we go through a series of reincarnations in the course of one lifetime. We are not exactly the same individual today as we were yesterday, although the difference may be unnoticeable. The change s distinctly marked over longer periods. looking backward we can see our lives divided into distinct periods which end and begin with some change in circumstance in domestic or business life; it may be a crisis which calls for quick decision, or the transition may be a gradual

one, of which we are unconscious.

In an article which appeared in the British Weekly many years ago, Robertson Nicol told of an interview he had with George Meredit, who an interview he had with George Meredith, who was at that time an old man in retirement at Box Hill. In the course of the conversation, Nicol raised the question of personal immortality, but Meredith hesitated in committing himself. He marked out several squares on the lawn with his stick and said, "I have been different persons in the course of my life — which longer if we hope to get all we nee one of these is immortal?"

The old poet and novelist was perhaps begging the question, but his answer was very sug-The George Meredith who wrote "Love in the Valley" - one of the most entrancing poems in the language - was a different in dividual from the decrepit old man who looked back upon the days of his youth. But throughout all the changes in his individual life, Meredith was one and the same person.

The same may be said of Bernard Shaw and G. K. Chesterton, whose characters were sketched by A. G. Gardiner about forty years ago in his book, "Prophets, Priests and Kings". started out as a conventional and orthodox young man, having been brought up on the Bible and "The Pilgrim's Progress". time that Gardiner wrote, Shaw had become a rampant rebel and a satirist of religion and of ind and things in general. Commenting upon Shaw's socialistic views at that time, Gardiner said:

"It is a dream as old as the conflict between intellect and emotion. It is based upon the assumption that the human soul has no yearnings that cannot be satisfied by the scientific adjustment of material relationships to the universe, a theory to which the Aristotelian replies that social wrong is only the symbol of spiritual wrong, and that spiritual remedies alone heal what is ultimately a spiritual malady."

Those words are just as true today, and

shaw appears to have come to that conclusion in his old age. He still tries to play the part of the Harlequin he once filled so well, although his role today is more that of the Pantaloon. G. K. Chesterton also underwent several dividual changes in the course of his public career. He broke into Fleet Street in a "cascade of laughter". Gardiner says he was "like a visitor out of some fairy tale, a legend in the flesh, a survival of the childhood of the world ...He is a wayfarer from the ages, stopping at the inn of life, warming himself at the fire and making the rafters ring with jolly laughter". He wrote brilliant weekly articles for the Daily News on anything and everything, and some-times on nothing. He peppered his copy with paradoxes and salted it with good humor. Someone said that he had "more brilliance than

light", but to read Chesterton in those early

days was to feel that "it was good to be alive, and to be young was very heaven".

That was G. K.C.'s first lustrum. But he took up politics and became a socialist, and he was never to be quite his careless, jovial young self again. In his Autobiography, Chesterton at one point says, "But I am here describing myself as I was". And he was several individuals. 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


WARNING

TO ALL PERSONS PLANNING TO MOVE TO Victoria · Vancouver · New Westminster Hamilton · Toronto · Ottawa · Hull

> As part of a plan to meet congested conditions, all persons who propose to rent or occupy family quarters in any of these Emergency Shelter Areas are required by Board order first to obtain a permit from the Administrator of Emergency Shelter for the district.

The purpose of the order is to help those who must be in these areas to obtain necessary accommodation.

Before completing arrangements to move to any of these districts, write to the Administrator for full particulars of the Emergency Shelter Regulations as they apply te that district.



Every person who rents or occupies family quarters in any of these districts contrary to the order, commits an offence and, in addition to other penalties, will be required by the Administrator to vacate the shelter and the district at his own expense.

The Emergency Shelter Regulations provide serious penalties for hindering or obstructing these efforts and for any contravention of the regulations or of an order of the Board or of the Administrators.
