Protect the benefit rights of your employees by sending in their expired books properly completed on March 31st.

There are severe penalties for failing to make Unemployment Insurance contributions for your insured employees and for failure to renew the Insurance Books as required.

In reply to questions asked by Mark Senn, M.P., in the House of Commons last Thursday, Hon. Ian MacKenzie, revealed that up to that date 591 acres of land in Haldimand County had been purchased under the Veteran's Land Settlement Scheme.

Price paid for the various properties ranged from \$38. to \$200. per acre, and the purchases included land in seven townships.

Red Cross Collections Well Over \$1,800.00 Objective

AGAIN PROVINCIAL LEADER

Rev. W. H. Fuller, campaign chair man of the Jarvis District Red Cross Branch reported total collections on Tuesday night of \$2018.90 in the Jarvis district with the exception of the Nanticoke section still to come in.

The combined Nanticoke-Jarvis districts had an objective of \$1800.00. Last year the local Branch collections, including Nanticoke, amounted to \$2117.11. This year the objective is \$1867.84. Nanticoke \$250.00. The Jarvis district therefore excelled last year's total more than \$125.00, and it is anticipated that Nanticoke will at least equal last year's collection.

The Campaign was again under the direction of Rev. W. H. Fuller, who is grateful for the assistance he has received from the various organizations and individuals who conducted the canvasses. Jarvis and district citizens have again demonstrated they are ready to support every worthy cause.

ONTARIO DIVISION RAISES FIVE MILLION

Ontario passed its \$5,000,000 objective in the Canadian Red Cross Society's National Campaign for funds to be used in the war effort. Headquarters in Toronto recently.

At the week's beginning, only about half of the Division's 460 branches - many of them in remote and rural areas - had made complete returns. But, though slow in beginning, in response to an urgent appeal from headquarters, the reports poured in and made it apparent that the Division's fifty per cent share of the national quota was more than assured.

"While the official date of the campaign is March 24th," said R. D. Davis, Campaign Chairman, stated, "many branches do not begin until the end of March 12th. And in cities where there are large industrial canyons to be made - many of them signed up 100 per cent by the end of the campaign."

Border Branch, with a quota of more than a quarter of a million, considerably topped the divisional target when Campaign Chairman, Mrs. Wallace Campbell announced that this branch had raised \$383,000.00. Brantford turned in \$108,000, topping their \$85,000.00 objective by more than \$23,000. North York, with a \$20,000.00 quota, reported collections of \$25,000.00.

Exact amount raised, in returns from 374 branches at this date, is \$5,055,328. This total will be increased when all returns from the 460 Branches are received.

## REGISTER NOW for FAMILY ALLOWANCES

Family Allowances will be paid every month for every eligible child under 16 years of age. First cheques will be mailed in July, 1945. Family Allowances are being paid to help parents in the care of their children, to help pay for medical, dental and nursing services—for better food, clothing and shelter, and to assist in equalizing opportunities for all children.

Registration forms have been mailed to every family. Fill in your form as soon as received. It is very simple—only seven questions—and information is given below to help you complete the form accurately. Do it right away in the interest of your children, as cheques can only be mailed to those eligible families which have completed and returned the Registration Form.

If you do not receive a form through the mail, please ask for one at the nearest Post Office.

DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL HEALTH AND WELFARE  
FAMILY ALLOWANCES REGISTRATION FORM

1. PRINT IN BLOCK LETTERS (LIKE THIS) the names of your children under 16 years of age. Write out the month of birth, then give day and year. Write name of place where each child was born. Complete each line by stating your relationship to child and if father and mother are applying, fill in both "relationship" columns.

2. Here the father and mother must both sign if both are at home. Then give the address to which cheques should be mailed. PRINT THIS IN BLOCK TYPE (LIKE THIS) under both signatures. The mother should not sign her husband's first name. She should sign her own first name, such as Mrs. Alice, Mary, Joan, etc.

3. If only one person has signed under question 2, state the reason why the other signature cannot be given. Give details—don't say Father or Mother is "away"—state where and for how long.

QUESTIONS 4, 5, 6 and 7. On the other side of the form must also be answered either "Yes" or "No" child, or children concerned. In the case of No. 5, if you have any children under 16 not living with you, list their names, give the reason and the complete address as to where they can be visited. If the answer to No. 7 is "Yes", give the details required.
