Als'ke has been an important crop in Haldimand County but more recently there has been difficulty in securing a satisfactory crop of seed. A Committee, Province Wide in scope, is now endeavoring to make a steady of the situation in an effort to discover the reason for this failure. This Committee is now anxious to secure the co-operation of a number of farmers in reporting their fields to the Committee and to permit certain practices being undertaken on those fields. At this season of the year there is always a temptation to turn young cattle out with the rest of the herd in order to simplify the herd managment problems. As a matter of fact, young dairy heifers, particularly those from six to ten months of age, will frequently do better in a stable. It is explained that the digestive system of a calf of this age is not fully developed and can not handle a sufficient quantity of grass to furnish the necessary nutrients for growth and development. Keeping them in the barn and supplying them with plenty of hay and water along with a good grain ration will grow a better heifer.

Calves from ten to twelve months of age can be put on pasture, and in many cases are, but they would be better if they could be fed grain once a day. Needless to cay, they also require plenty of shade and ample water. It is recognized that, other conditions being equal, large cows produce more milk and produce


