STATESMAN SMUTS

Vandyke-Bearded, warrior-states-man Jan Christian Smuts, one of the major participants in drafting the League of Nations Covenant, is expected to take a leading part in planning international cooperation for lasting peace at the Security Conference.

Smuts again became Prime Min-ister of Union of South Africa in 1939 and quickly organized his country's resources and defenses for war against the Axis.
