WELCOME HOME

THIS WEEK we are happy to welcome home a soldier who has been overseas for more than five long years. Warren Fess, along with his brother Ralph, was among the first from this district to enlist for service. He saw action on the Italian and Western European fronts and in one engagement suffered wounds on his right hand and leg. He knows what War is all about.

It is not likely he will appreciate just how happy his many friends are in seeing him back home again. But there is a deep relief to see the boys return and the realization that the burden they have carried no longer rests heavily upon them.

STRANGE CHARGES

MR. E. B. JOLIFFE, leader of the Provincial C.C.F. Party, is a pleasant, mild-mannered man to meet. His accusations, directed at Premier Drew, in his radio address last Thursday evening, of maintaining a secret "Gestapo" spy system in this province, was not received with the significance it was apparently hoped for.

In view of his own acknowledgement that he had such information for some time it becomes only too apparent that the charges were made only ten days before the election for the purpose only of winning votes for his party. There have been many smart political moves in the past that the public can look back upon and give the author some measure of credit for his astuteness, but in this case it is difficult to believe such will be the case.

Col. Drew's record throughout his entire life has been such as to draw the admiration of all sound thinking Canadians. And while no

man is perfect and susceptible to the pitfalls of life, yet not too many will attach much credit to the C.C.F. leader's charges in face of the complete and emphatic denials of Premier Drew. We are sorry E. B. Joliffe saw fit to align himself with the plan to discredit Premier Drew as he did. In immediately announcing that a Royal Commission would be appointed to completely investigate the charges, the Premier comes very close to vindicating himself and consequently Mr. Joliffe has slipped down the ladder of public opinion. We can't imagine the move was made by Mr. Joliffe himself, but on the advice of his party's strategists who have done their party and consequently their leader, more damage than they now suspect.

DUAL RESPONSIBILITY

A CANADIAN of high military rank with a broad peacetime political background recently returned to Canada from Germany with a sharp mental picture of the difference between the average Canadian and the average German in his outlook toward those who enter political life.

Briefly, he found the German all too ready to exalt and bow down before those in political power, be they German or Allied. Equally he found himself back amid people who, with a federal election campaign swirling about them, were frequently cynical and sceptical of the methods and motives of those democratically seeking office.

Somewhere between the two there must be a more solid medium. Of the two evils, the average Canadian's is certainly the lesser. But any examination of the basis of this scepticism must divulge a certain weakness somewhere in the Canadian democratic pattern.

The blame, it would seem, rests upon twin responsibilities.

That the parties have failed fully to impress upon the people their honesty of purpose, appears obvious in the face of the election results. That the people of Canada have not achieved full political maturity, that they have not a proper appreciation of their responsibilities in a modern free state borne in on one who, like this Canadian G.I. military and political background, returns to his country after an absence that lets him see it in new perspective.

To anyone who has seen, say, the watchdog attitude of the British electorate, the disingenuousness of the mass of Italians, the fiery posture of liberated Greeks, this nonchalant acceptance by Canadians of the privileges of democracy is at once strange and dangerous.

Now, more than ever before, is the time for awakening to the fact that Canadians share in one of the few solid strongholds of liberty. But with this privilege goes heavy responsibilities.

MIXED GRAINS RECOMMENDED FOR LATE SEEDING
Farmers who have been unable to complete seeding owing to wet weather are advised to give consideration at this time to sowing a portion of their acreage to a mixture of early maturing varieties of oats and barley.

Over a six-year period at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, a mixture of O.A.C. 21 barley and Alaska Oats yielded 2,363 pounds per acre and a mixture of O.A.C. 21 barley and Alaska Oats produced 2,332 pounds per acre. No other barley and Oats mixture yielded more than 2,332 pounds per acre. The value of this mixture crop in regard to yield of grain and quality of feed for livestock has been proven. However it must be emphasized that these results were obtained only by the use of the proper proportions of various grains and by haphazard sowing. Each grain should be sown separately and mixed each year. If the seed on hand is mixed, it is suggested that the farmer should use the nearest seed cleaning plant he used to separate the mixture. The machine used should be equipped with a Carter Disc separator which will make a very satisfactory job of re-mixing. Barley from Oats After the separation has been made, grains may be re-mixed in their proper proportions.

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The Week in Ottawa

Canadian Press Staff Writer, Ottawa, May 20. — (CP) — Plans are under way to make permanent in the post-war era Canada's war record as a major supplier of the world's needs.

That was apparent as the week brought two important developments in the export field. The first was the announcement by Finance Minister Islay of the granting of a \$25,000,000 credit to the Netherlands for the purchase of Canadian supplies. The second was word that Graham Towers, governor of the Bank of Canada and other Canadian financial officials will arrive in London shortly to discuss with British treasury officials a proposal that Canada extend credits to Britain.

Regarding the credit agreement between Canada and the Netherlands, Mr. Islay said that the move was intended to be followed by another credit on the same terms and the proceeds of these credits are to be expended during the next five years, and are to be paid in the succeeding five years.

The minister made no mention of what the Netherlands might be purchasing in Canada, but it was believed from the Canadian press that the cattle ranches of the west and the orchards of British Columbia and the Maritimes would be at least one of the needs of the liberated low country.

Aid To Britain
In connection with the financial mission to London, officials here said that after Japan is beaten Britain is going to need Canadian and American dollars with which to buy Canadian goods. If the mother country is to continue to buy at her pre-war import rate she will have to be assisted through the granting of credits.

Taking the pre-war scale of 1938, Britain bought goods from Canada valued at \$339,700,000 while the value of British goods brought into Canada was \$119,000,000. Word came that steps were being taken to enlarge Britain to buy from Canada on that or possibly an increased scale was good news indeed for Canadian farmers and manufacturers.

Coupled with this was the disclosure of a new priorities order under which small Canadian businesses will be given assistance in obtaining necessary for a switch-over from war to civilian production. The new order will obtain priorities for Canadian businesses whose total production is less than \$50,000 per year. It will be given in getting production materials including steel and aluminum and machine tools and other materials.

On the Farm Front
BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER
— By Haldimand Harry —
With the season being so far advanced and little or no corn yet planted, Haldimand farmers will be turning their attention to the earlier maturing varieties of corn. A special pamphlet just issued lists practically all varieties available and separates them according to maturity.

This column cannot attempt to list them all but the following commonly known varieties are recommended: Very Early Maturity—Can. 275, Can. 278, and Can. 355; Early Maturity—Punka C 184, Dekalb 65, Pioneer 355, Can. 531. Commonly known Medium varieties include Dekalb 240, Can. 606, Pioneer 358A. A complete list as well as a new pamphlet on the growing of the crop can be had from your agricultural representative.

It has been reported that a rash of Mastitis is showing up in herds in sections of the County. This is a serious situation as it can cause heavy losses to dairymen. Space in this column does not permit a complete discussion of this subject, but there is plenty of literature available to acquaint themselves with full details of the disease and ways and means of control.

First and foremost prevention is better than cure. Indeed, there does not seem to be any "sure-fire" rule to follow in treatment. Time is one factor and control measures should be instituted immediately the disease is noticed. Various factors must be considered and a veterinarian should be called in to determine these.

If no veterinarian is immediately available then the farmer can be helped with the following unit can be
