Prog. Conservatives Win 67 Seats

Haldimand-Norfolk Re-elects Chas. Martin By Big Majority

Ahead Of Nearest Opponent By 4500 Votes

C.C.F. LOSE HEAVILY

Charles H. Martin, Progressive Conservative member of the legislature at the time of dissolution was re-elected by the voters of Haldimand-Norfolk on Monday with a strong majority over A. F. Head Liberal and Leo LaFortune, C.C.F. standard bearers.

In the balloting throughout the Ninety-mile long riding, the Progressive Conservative candidate retained his strength in nearly every poll, while the C.C.F. party showed a weakening, which was reflected by a gain for the Liberal party. More interest was evidenced by the fact that 2185 more voters went to the polls this time over the by-election in 1943. From this increase the Progressive Conservatives gained 849 votes, the Liberals 3082, while the C.C.F. lost 1746 less votes.

Complete returns for the Haldimand section of the riding were completed by The Record less than two hours after the polls closed. The first return came from the Indian Reserve where seven ballots were cast: six went to Martin and one to Head. In the by-election this small poll gave the C.C.F. party six votes and the Progressive Conservative six. Poll No. 65, Oneida reported six, 714 o'clock, showing a gain for the Liberal party at the expense of the C.C.F., while the Progressive Conservative retained the strength they held in the previous vote. No. 4, Rainham, was the third reported with forty-five for Martin, thirty-three for Head and one for LaFortune. There were twelve C.C.F. votes.

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Ontario Electors Give Strong Support To Drew Candidates; Opposition Leaders Defeated

C.C.F. Party Lose Twenty Six Seats; Liberal Party Now Resumes Role Of Official Opposition

The Progressive Conservative party under the leadership of Lt. Col. George A. Drew made a sweeping win in the Provincial elections held on Monday. Mitchell F. Hepburn, leader of the Liberal party and E. B. Joffe, C.C.F. leader were both defeated in their respective ridings of Elgin and South York. On the basis of the latest civilian voting figures the standing is as follows: Progressive Conservative, Sixty-six seats; Liberal, eleven; C.C.F. Six; Liberal-Labour, Two; Labour-Progressive, Two; Doubtful, Three.

The total vote registered exceeded the vote in 1943 by more than 140,000 votes although fewer people went to the polls than in the 1937 election which put Mitchell Hepburn back into power with Sixty-four seats. The C.C.F. party suffered in popularity with less support almost generally throughout the province. In 1943 when the C.C.F. party gained thirty-four seats to form the official opposition 417,007 voters gave them their support. In the voting on Monday which gave them Six seats 313,512 ballots were cast in their favour. Support for the Liberal party also decreased slightly, while the Progressive Conservatives gained nearly 200,000.

Most significant was the turnover in the industrial sections of the province considered C.C.F. strongholds. The City of Hamilton, Toronto and Windsor made almost a complete turnover to the Progressive Conservatives. The Drew forces gained Twenty seats from the C.C.F. and Eight from the Liberals.

For the first time since 1929 the Progressive Conservatives will return to Queen's Park with a majority Government. The people of the Province expressed their faith in the integrity of Premier Drew despite the last minute charges against leader Joffe that the Government was maintaining a Secret Police unit for the purpose of spying on the position.

Although the returns so far are based on the civilian vote, the Active Service voters, numbering 125,000, will not make any material change, although three or four seats could be altered by the vote in the Armed Forces overseas.

Premier Drew in a statement to the press when the returns were made known on Monday night, said that his over-all majority would bring strong and stable Government for Ontario.
