Hess, who had read novels and aid scant attention to early portions of the trial, created a sensation when he told the court he had simulated loss of memory for "tactical" reasons and said he would stand responsible for all his actions. The dramatic announcement followed a half bour legal battle over whether he should stand trial even though he suffered temporarily from amnesia. A board of psychiatrists had reported that Hess was "not insane" in the strict sense, but that his loss of memory "might interfere" with his ability to make his defence. One American psychiatrist who had examined Hess said that Hess' action was a return to the typical hysterical personality he had constantly manifested. "Undoubtedly, after years of practice in purposeful forgetting in England, he is unable to recall certain events of the past, but it is obvious that he using amnesia as a defence," the expert said.


