Night" in Delhi last week, Dr. E. G. Pleva, Professor of Geography at the University of Western Ontario, told his audience that several of Southern Ontario's most prosperous agricultural districts are fast becoming virtual brickyards. He deplored the practice of exploiting the land without putting anything back and cit-ed examples where land had been tilled to sterility due to the lack of foresight on the part of agriculturists.
