CANCER

Township of Walpole By-Law No. 1104
 By Law No. 1104 of the Township of Walpole to provide for payment for loss of poultry killed by dogs or wild animals.
 Be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted by the Council of the Township of Walpole in council assembled as follows:
 (1) To pay for poultry, owned by any person or persons, resident within the said Municipality, which is killed by dogs or wild animals, within the said Municipality, at the then current market price of such poultry.
 (2) All claims must be for the amount in excess of 25 lbs. weight.
 (3) Maximum claim to be \$100.
 (4) The Township shall not be liable for the cost of the valuation of such poultry, and shall appraise and determine all losses under this act.

 Ottawa, April 24 — (CP) — Memorial services were held in this city today for the late J. J. Parsons, who died in Ottawa on Monday. The services were held at the home of Mrs. Parsons, 1215 St. Patrick St., at 2 o'clock. The Rev. J. J. Parsons, a member of the Anglican Church, was the officiating minister. The services were held in the presence of a large number of friends and relatives. The Rev. J. J. Parsons was a well-known figure in Ottawa, and his death was a great loss to the community.

Veteran Township Official Honoured By Colleagues
BIRTHDAY GREETINGS
 J. J. PARSONS, CLERK OF WALPOLE, WAS EIGHTY-TWO YESTERDAY.
 Mr. J. J. Parsons, veteran clerk of the Township of Walpole, and a citizen with an unusual record of public service, was honored by his colleagues and friends on his eightieth birthday yesterday. Mr. Parsons was born in Ontario, and has spent most of his life in Walpole. He has served as clerk of the Township since 1909, and has been a member of the Council and the Executive Committee of the Township since 1922. He has also served as Reeve of the Township for several years. Mr. Parsons is a well-known and respected figure in the community, and his long and distinguished service to the Township is a source of pride to all who know him.

Under The Floodlights

On the Farm Front
 Among the arrivals aboard the I. de France which docked at Halifax early this week were: Hon. J. N. C. Heaton, Nanticoke and Mr. A. Rawcliffe, Nanticoke. Both of these men arrived in Hamilton at the Army Trades School yesterday.
 A demand farmer who has accommodation and who is interested should get in touch with the local office of the National Employment Service.
 Beekeepers and potential beekeepers will be interested in knowing that a reprint has recently been made of the Dominion Bulletin entitled "Bees and How to Keep Them." This is a very complete treatise on the subject and is now available at the office of your agricultural representative or it may be obtained by writing to the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.
 Pastures of a suitable type are now considered essential for poultry. This is particularly true in the case of growing birds but they are valuable for older stock as well. The Poultry Department at Guelph points out that almost any kind of green forage crop will do. Other grasses and corn appear most useful. Other grasses and clovers can be used as supplementary crops during the fall and early spring.
 For poultry pastures the following recommendations are given: The spring pasture should be sown in the spring. Early sowing of cereal crops, usually oats at four bushels per acre gives good results. Corn alone planted thickly or supplemented with rape or kale is also valuable.
 Annual pastures — Fall ryegrass sown in late August or September gives the earliest pasture in the spring. Early sowing of cereal crops, usually oats at four bushels per acre gives good results. Corn alone planted thickly or supplemented with rape or kale is also valuable.
