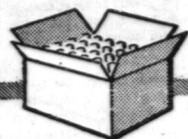

Young Men Entering Ministry Need Pension Fund Backing, States Moderator, United Church

Interviewed regarding the Dominion-wide United Church drive now under way for new capital needed for the ministry Pension Fund, Dr. J. A. Pratten, Moderator of the United Church of Canada stated that "when young men enter the ministry they surrender the possibility of material advancement and the accumulation of worldly wealth. They undertake to spend the whole of their working years in service to individuals and communities. For that service the monetary return is usually small. Over the last few years one half of ministers received less than \$1,500 yearly."

The moderator stated that the church "in view of this fact that the church is now being carried out by volunteer canvassers representing all local churches. It is understood in Canada and Newfoundland. The objective of the drive is \$1/2 million to place the pension fund on a sound basis and the drive continues until May 16th, 1946.

What every housewife should know...

about SUGAR FOR CANNING

There is a world-wide shortage of sugar. Last year world sugar production was twenty-five percent below 1935. Reasons for the decrease are:

- Destruction of the sugar industries in Java and the Philippines.
- Shortages of labour and fertilizers in many sugar-producing countries.
- Last year's drought in the Caribbean area, especially Cuba.
- Damage to European sugar beet fields.

World sugar supplies are pooled for the benefit of the United Nations. Canada, the United States and Great Britain are allotted an equal share of sugar according to population. Available supplies must also be shared with other countries.

TEN POUNDS OF CANNING SUGAR PER PERSON

This year's canning sugar allowance is ten pounds per person - the same as last year. Instead of special canning sugar coupons, ten additional green "S" coupons are being made available for the purchase of canning sugar.

SS to S12 inclusive become valid on May 2nd; S17 to S21 inclusive on July 4th. Each coupon is good for the purchase of one pound of sugar.

The ten "S" coupons for canning sugar are in addition to the "S" coupons which regularly become valid each month for the purchase of sugar and preserves.

Those who do not wish to do home canning may use the extra coupons to buy commercially packed, jams, jellies, canned fruit, etc., or sugar to supplement the regular ration.

The ten "S" coupons for canning sugar may be given and used immediately they become valid. You will be given ample notice of their expiry date.

AMOUNT OF SUGAR USED IN CANNING

Each housewife may use her canning sugar to fit the needs of her particular household. A common method is to allow 1/2 lb. sugar for each quart of jam or jelly, and 1 1/2 lbs. sugar for each quart of jam or jelly.

SUGARLESS METHOD OF CANNING FRUIT

Many home economists recommend the sugarless method of canning fruit. Sugar can be added during the winter as the fruit is used. If you have not a copy already, write the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for "War-time Canning" pamphlet.

A CORNER ON TOURISTS

In 1945, although gasoline rationing was not lifted until August, 2,670,000 American motor cars came in for less than forty-eight-hour stays and \$54,000 for longer periods. Competent authorities estimate Ontario's yearly share of tourist revenues as 60% to 70% of Canada's total. The province reports at least 10,000,000 American visitors in 1946.

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
