To Visit Hamilton Hamilton, April 29 - His Excellency, the Governor General, Viscount Alexander of Tonis and Errigal has indicated that he will attend opening

indicated that he will attend opening s day ceremonies of Hamilton's Centential celebrations July 1st.

In a letter to W. Denis Whitaker, director of the Centennial, The Hon. Colin Gibson, minister of national defence for air, confirmed the governor general's intention of coming to Hamilton. defence for air, confirmed the governor general's intention of coming to Hamilton.

The air minister's letter to Col. Whitaker reads in part:

"I have your letter of April 22 concerning the attendance of His Excellency the Governor General for the opening of the celebration on the 1st of July. I have spoken to Major-General Letson, private secretary to the Governor General, and he assures me that His Excellency is planning to be in Hamilton on opening day."

Mr. Gibson says the governor general will likely spend the entire day in Hamilton where he will be the guest of several civic organizations. During the night his private car may be moved to Toronto and travel from there to Owen Sound the next morning.
