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LOCAL FIRM MUST SHIP 75% OF SKIMMILK POWDER OVERSEAS

The Dairy Products Board at Ottawa has issued order No. 88 which requires all licensed concentrated milk plants in Ontario and Quebec to set aside seventy-five per cent of their production of dry skim milk for overseas shipment to the United Kingdom.

The Marshall Dairy Limited is directly affected by this ruling which takes effect beginning August 1st. The local plant was manufacturing around forty barrels of dry skim milk daily in the period of peak production but this figure has fallen rapidly as pastures dried up during the past three weeks.

Earlier this year the Canadian Government through the Dairy Producers' Board pledged the British Ministry of Food a total of six million pounds of dry skim milk powder for more than seven million pounds was shipped overseas. But so far this year, due to increased domestic consumption, very little of the amount pledged has been shipped.

The province's pea canning industry, whose growth has been aided by the recovery of stability for the growing pea canning industry in Ontario, E. R. Coulson, Sales Division Manager, American Can Company in Canada, said today.

During the war years, when Ontario's pack of canned peas hit an all-time record, Canadians increased their consumption of this commodity from 2.7 pounds, canned weight, per person in 1939 to more than six pounds in 1944, Mr. Coulson said.
