Nearly six billion pounds of milk are con-Nearly six billion pounds of milk are consumed or processed annually in Ontario; the yearly value of Ontario dairy products runs around \$140,000,000; Ontario butter and cheese production is about 200,000,000 pounds a year. The chief credit for these fat figures, which are about one-third of the totals for the entire Dominion, goes to Ontario's 1,200,000 milk cows—themselves a third of Canada's dairy herds. The Province's 8,000,000 gallons of ice cream, however, amount annually to 50% of the nation's 'sundae-best'—which may explain the noticeable cone-consciousness of young Ontarians.
