EDINBURGH IS A LOFTY CITY—

I LIKED EDINBURGH at first sight. To me there was something "high and lifted up" about the city and its people.

There is a distinct difference between the Scots and the English; it is the difference that one finds between the northern and southern people of every country.

Edinburgh is an ancient city with a modern spirit and outlook. It cherishes its historic past, as illustrated in the preservation of the Castle on the Rock, with its impressive National War Memorial and other relics of the past.

There may be some places in Edinburgh that should be cleaned-up or pulled down. The spacious grandeur of Princes Street is in striking contrast to other congested parts of the city with their five and six story tenements.

The entire city is built of grey stone—there isn't a red brick to be seen anywhere. The first impression is one of solidity and is not unpleasing, but the heavy, grey uniformity of street after street of stone buildings and dwellings becomes rather monotonous, and one longs to turn a corner and see a street or even a house of a different color or material.

But I liked Edinburgh and the Edinburghers in Britain, and the editor, Murray Watson, is a gentleman. He displayed a keen interest in Canada and I could tell him little that he did not already know about Canadian affairs.
