Highlights of the News

40,000 Idle in Ontario Plants
A survey showed that strikes in Ontario have made 40,000 workers idle in plants affected by the production of basic iron and steel. In the Toronto area alone, 12,500 persons have been thrown out of work.

Here is the detailed picture for Ontario and for the Toronto area: Rubber workers' strike, 10,000 (Toronto area, 6,000); brass workers' strike, 1,000 (Toronto area, 1,000); electrical workers' strike, 7,000 (Toronto area, 3,000); automobile workers' strike, 4,500; steel workers' strike, 8,000; Massey-Harris layoff, 5,000 (Toronto area, 2,500).

In addition, it is estimated that approximately 5,000 more on employees of strike-bound plants who are not in the bargaining unit of the union have been forced out of work because of the strikes.

Civil War Spreads in China
In Nanking, General Marshall and United States Ambassador Stuart stated that a general peace for China appeared impossible although the Chinese people were "practically unanimous" in their desire for a peaceful solution of the political problems confronting their nation.

Canada Second
South Africa won the King George V Trophy for miniature rifle shooting among British Empire Boys, the National Rifle Association which organized the tournament announced, Canada placed second.

Greece Seeks Loan
Greece, planning a huge industrial program, is looking to Washington for a \$5,000,000 loan.

Lack of Steel Closes Plants
All Canadian plants of Massey-Harris Co. Ltd. have been closed down for a minimum of three weeks because of the country's shortage of steel and other materials.

Britain and Iran
British circles said that if Britain moved troops into oil-rich Iran to protect British interests and property, such action would be in full accord with the United Nations charter.

London Gas Workers Strike
Restaurant keepers and housewives of London, England resorted to wartime expedients in a desperate effort to cook meals as London gas supplies shrunk to the "worst point ever" because of a strike by gas workers.

Mail Contact Accounting
The gangplank is down on this Jewish refugee ship anchored at Haifa Harbor, but there are no small boats to take the refugees to Palestine. They are some of the 4000 refugees marooned in the harbor as British authorities extended their blockade to prevent landing of illegal immigrants.

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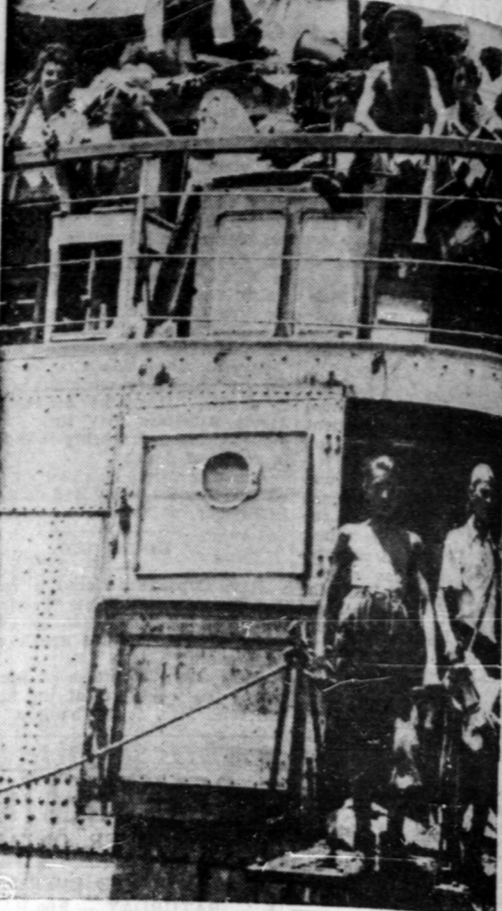

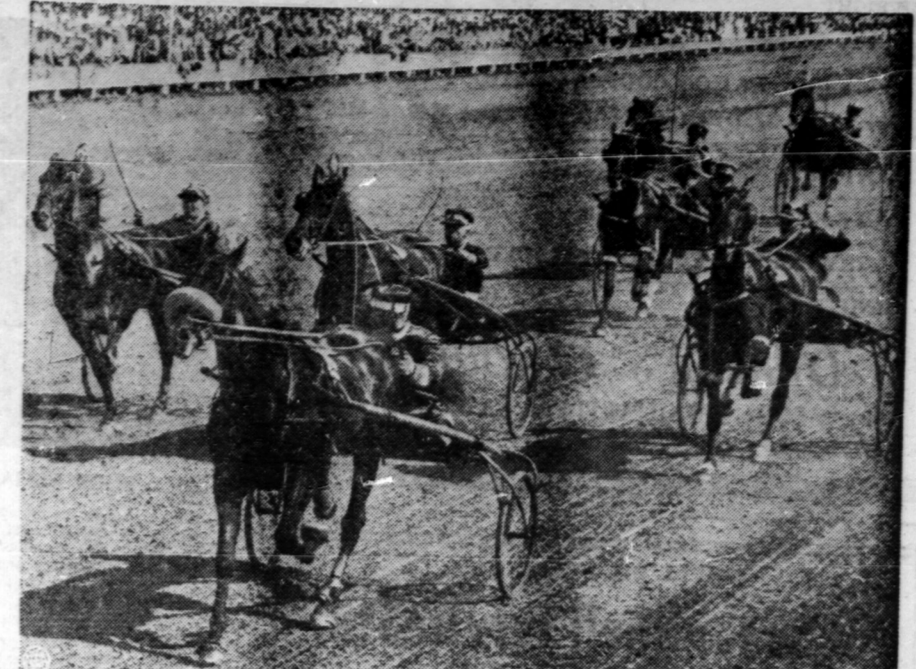

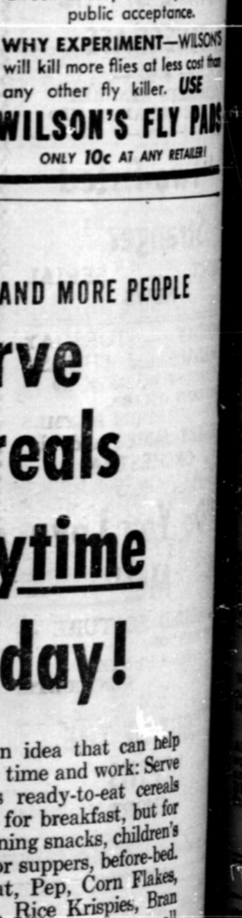
